### Agenda Item 6 Investigation Report

Investigator Greg Francois reported that the division opened nine matters and closed thirteen which includes intakes, complaints and investigations. One matter remains ongoing and a second was opened on January 26 after the board report was printed. Mr. Francois read an email that Ms. Geary received from Kevin Salazar with the Veterinarian Corporation of America pertaining to reporting controlled drug losses in the veterinary setting. Mr. Salazar wanted to **know** if the Vet board wanted to be informed of drug losses reported. Mr. Francois asked the board for their opinion. The board stated they only had to report losses and pills dispensed to the federal DEA. Dr. Priddy stated Alaska does not have a state drug enforcement agency.

Mr. Francois advised the Board would need to go into executive session regarding a newly opened case.

On a motion duly made by Dr. Hagee, seconded by Dr. Rose and approved unanimously, it was RESOLVED to go into executive session in accordance with 44.62.310(c)(2), and Alaska Constitutional Right to Privacy Provisions, for the purpose of reviewing and discussing investigative matters.

# Agenda Item 6 Budget Report

Martha Hewlett, Administrative Officer II, joined the Board meeting via conference call. Ms. Hewlett went over the FY 15 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter and FY 16 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter schedule of revenues

and expenditures. The board had no questions on the quarter reports. Ms. Hewlett presented an update on travel changes. She explained the division is looking at ways to be more efficient and streamline travel cost. Each board will now be required to fill out a report at the end of each meeting summarizing the achievements of the board meeting and any items that were not finalized and will be carried over to the next meeting.

The Board thanked Ms. Hewlett for her time.

#### Agenda Item 8 Old and New Business

**CE** Request for Medical Acupuncture for Veterinarians. Ashley Harmon sent an email requesting CE approval for CE taken at Colorado State University. Dr. Beck noted the course is not RACE approved but wondered if CSU had recognized and approved the program.

 On a motion duly made by Dr. Beck, seconded by Dr. Hagee and approved unanimously it was moved to approve the Medical Acupuncture for Veterinarians course by Dr. Narda Robinson at Colorado State University if they can prove the confirmation of endorsement or sponsorship by CSU or RACE for CE credit.

Kevin Wellington CE Request. Dr. Rose stated the conference isn't close to being eligible for RACE approval. Much of it is taught by lay floaters. The Veterinarians are not boarded in anything. When technicians are doing the dentistry in a clinic and a Veterinarian is giving oversight insinuating a Vet knows more about dentistry than the technician, however, if the veterinarian knew more about dentistry in these situations they would be doing the dentistry. Virtually if there is a vet there for sedation they are only there to get the money for sedation. There is no true veterinarian oversight when lay floaters are doing dentistry. She further noted the standard should be higher for veterinarians seeking CE. There are plenty of quality RACE approved CE's for equine dentistry taught by boarded veterinarians. In Alaska it is incredibly easy and affordable to get CE's on online. Dr. Beck felt based on previous approval by the board the course should be approved for 2015 CE's but not be approved in the future. Dr. Priddy said this is the last opportunity the board will approve this conference. The board recommended preapproval be sought prior to paying for a conference or a person go to any conference they prefer but be sure to get required CE's from approved providers.

On a motion duly made by Dr. Priddy and seconded by Dr. Hagee it was moved to accept Dr. Wellington's request for CE credit for the 2015 International Association of Equine Dentistry conference. However, the board will likely not accept a conditional approval for this course in the future. If said course subject does not specifically meet the guidelines spelled out in 12AAC 68.230 preapproval will be necessary.

 Brian Berube works for the Alaska Native Tribal Consortium in the Community Environment and Health Department. Mr. Berube addressed the board concerning the Healthy Dog Initiative that is in the preliminary stages. It will be a working project to expand routine animal care services in Alaskan villages and improve environmental conditions. Also on the team are Dr. Arleigh Reynolds and Dr. Karsten Hueffer at UAF. The program hopes to use UAF professors and Vet externs to deal with animal control issues. Dr. Beck said if UAF students were going to be doing surgeries that a possible regulation project would be needed in the future. Dr. Hagee suggested the team visit with and seek help from the Alaska Veterinary Medical Association. He applauds the group's

effort. Dr. Priddy gave Mr. Berube the AVMA President's contact information.

**RoadRunner Pharmacy.** Presented to the Board for information only. Dr. Beck noted the AVMA is keeping an eye on this.

American Association of Veterinary State Boards. Presented to the Board for information only regarding tracking CE's and regulation news.

American Association of Veterinary State Boards. Presented to the Board for information only regarding upcoming open positions.

Email Concerning Working Interviews. Scott Warner sent an email to Ms. Geary requesting what Alaska law allows him to do during a working interview. Dr. Beck said there are exceptions for courtesy licenses if they have a sponsor. Dr. Priddy noted that courtesy licenses have a sponsor but they are not necessarily working under direct supervision. Dr. Priddy and Dr. Rose asked if another definition could be added for a courtesy license that would be for a working interview. Dr. Hagee said if an applicant is going to multiple practices to interview they should have each practice sign the sponsoring page but still be under one courtesy license fee. Dr. Priddy asked where a recently graduated vet would fall under if they were coming to Alaska for a working interview since they would not qualify for a permit. Dr. Beck said the new regulation could possibly state a person could fall under the working interview definition within 3 months after graduation. Dr. Beck said the board will discuss more on this topic when the board gets to the regulations agenda.

Sarah Meintel CE Request. Applicant requests CE's be approved for Medical
Acupuncture for Veterinarians. Dr. Hagee stated that as in the earlier request Colorado
State University will have to prove CSU has endorsed the conference. The board noted
AKVMA members should check if CE's are approved before going to a big conference
and investing time and travel expenses.

Email from Major Clarissa Hackett regarding Operation Artic Care in Kodiak, AK. Dr. Rose stated the military has come to Alaska every year. She noted the polite professional thing to do is send a letter to the AKVMA members and community practices that live and work in Kodiak and ask does this interfere with their practice. Dr. Priddy and Dr. Hagee said in the past they have received letters from Operation Artic Care stating they were coming to Alaska and asked if their operation was going to interfere with your practice. Dr. Priddy said it never got in his way. The board reiterated the following:

Sec. 08.98.125. Exemptions. This chapter does not apply to the following:

- (1) a veterinary medical officer in the military service in the discharge of official duties or as an employee in the federal or state government performing veterinary medical services within the scope of the person's official duties;
- (2) a veterinarian who is licensed in another state or country, or a person whose expertise a veterinarian licensed in this state believes would benefit an animal, and who provides only consultation to a veterinarian licensed in this state; in this paragraph, "consultation" means advice or assistance provided in person, telephonically, electronically, or by any other method of communication from a veterinarian or other person whose expertise, in the opinion of the veterinarian, would benefit the animal; and (3) a veterinarian licensed and residing in another state who provides assistance, as requested by and under the supervision of a veterinarian licensed in this state, for the purpose of providing skills not otherwise available in this state in conducting research or other practice of veterinary medicine on captive or free-ranging wildlife; however, that assistance is limited to not more than three events in a calendar year for not more than a total of 60 days in the year and may not be on a regular or recurring basis, as defined by the board.

**2016 Meetings Scheduled.** The Board agreed on a teleconference June 3, 2016 at 10:00am and September 30, 2016 at 10:00am at the Atwood Building in Anchorage, AK.

The board reviewed and approved 32 Iditarod applications and 3 applications for Vet Tech licensure for applicants who successfully passed the fall VTNE.

## Agenda Item 9 Regulations

The Board tabled the regulation project until the June meeting. Dr. Beck will work on language for a working interview regulation project to fall under the courtesy license definition. Dr. Rose will work on language for what a student extern can do.

Agenda Item 10 Adjourn

There being no further business, Dr. Priddy made a motion to adjourn the meeting, Dr Hagee seconded it. All were in favor.
