ETHICS ACT PROCEDURES FOR BOARDS & COMMISSIONS

All board and commission members and staff should be familiar with the Executive Branch Ethics Act procedures outlined below.

Who Is My Designated Ethics Supervisor (DES)?

Every board or commission subject to the Ethics Act¹ has several ethics supervisors designated by statute.

- The chair serves as DES for board or commission members.
- The chair serves as DES for the executive director.
- The executive director serves as DES for the staff.
- The governor is the DES for a chair.²

What Do I Have To Disclose?

The Ethics Act requires members of boards and commissions to disclose:

- Any matter that is a potential conflict of interest with actions that the member may take when serving on the board or commission.
- Any circumstance that may result in a violation of the Ethics Act.
- Any personal or financial interest (or that of an immediate family member) in a state grant, contract, lease or loan that is awarded or administered by the member's board or commission.
- The receipt of certain gifts.

The executive director of the board or commission and its staff, as state employees, must also disclose:

- Compensated outside employment or services.
- Volunteer service, if any compensation, including travel and meals, is paid or there is a potential conflict with state duties.

For more information regarding the types of matters that may result in violations of the Ethics
Act, board or commission members should refer to the guide, "Ethics Information for Members of
Boards and Commissions." The executive director and staff should refer to the guide, Ethics
Information for Public Employees." Both guides and disclosure forms may be found on the
Department of Law's ethics website.

How Do I Avoid Violations of the Ethics Act?

- · Make timely disclosures!
- · Follow required procedures!
- Provide all information necessary to a correct evaluation of the matter!³
- · When in doubt, disclose and seek advice!
- Follow the advice of your DES!

What Are The Disclosure Procedures for Board and Commission Members?

The procedural requirements for disclosures by members are set out in AS 39.52.220 and 9 AAC 52.120. One goal of these provisions is to help members avoid violations of the Ethics Act. The procedures provide the opportunity for members to seek review of matters in advance of taking action to ensure that actions taken will be consistent with the Act.

Procedure for declaring actual or potential conflicts.

Members must declare potential conflicts and other matters that may violate the Ethics Act on the public record and in writing to the chair.

Disclosure on the public record. Members must identify actual and potential conflicts orally at the board or commission's public meeting **in advance** of participating in deliberations or taking any official action on the matter.

- A member must always declare a conflict and may choose to refrain from voting, deliberations or other participation regarding a matter.⁴
- If a member is uncertain whether participation would result in a violation of the Act, the member should disclose the circumstances and seek a determination from the chair.

Disclosure in writing at a public meeting. In addition to an oral disclosure at a board or commission meeting, members' disclosures must be made in writing.

- If the meeting is recorded, a tape or transcript of the meeting is preserved and there is a method
 for identifying the declaration in the record, an oral disclosure may serve as the written
 disclosure.
- Alternatively, the member must note the disclosure on the Notice of Potential Violation disclosure form and the chair must record the determination.

Confidential disclosure in advance of public meeting. Potential conflicts may be partially addressed in advance of a board or commission's public meeting based on the published meeting agenda or other board or commission activity.

- A member identifying a conflict or potential conflict submits a Notice of Potential Violation to the chair, as DES, in advance of the public meeting.
- This written disclosure is considered confidential.
- The chair may seek advice from the Attorney General.
- The chair makes a written determination, also confidential, whether the disclosed matter represents a conflict that will result in a violation of the Ethics Act if the member participates in official action addressing the matter.
- If so, the chair directs the member to refrain from participating in the matter that is the subject of the disclosure.
- An oral report of the notice of potential violation and the determination that the member must refrain from participating is put on the record at a public meeting.⁶

Determinations at the public meeting. When a potential conflict is declared by a member for the public record, the following procedure must be followed:

- The chair states his or her determination regarding whether the member may participate.
- Any member may then object to the chair's determination.
- If an objection is made, the members present, excluding the member who made the disclosure, vote on the matter.
- Exception: A chair's determination that is made consistent with advice provided by the Attorney General may not be overruled.
- If the chair, or the members by majority vote, determines that a violation will exist if the disclosing member continues to participate, the member must refrain from voting, deliberating or participating in the matter.⁷

If the chair identifies a potential conflict, the same procedures are followed. If possible, the chair should forward a confidential written notice of potential violation to the Office of the Governor for a determination in advance of the board or commission meeting. If the declaration is first

made at the public meeting during which the matter will be addressed, the members present, except for the chair, vote on the matter. If a majority determines that a violation of the Ethics Act will occur if the chair continues to participate, the chair shall refrain from voting, deliberating or participating in the matter. A written disclosure or copy of the public record regarding the oral disclosure should be forwarded to the Office of the Governor for review by the chair's DES.

Procedures for Other Member Disclosures

A member's interest in a state grant, contract, lease or loan and receipt of gifts are disclosed by filling out the appropriate disclosure form and submitting the form to the chair for approval. The disclosure forms are found on the Department of Law's ethics website.

What Are The Disclosure Procedures for Executive Directors and Staff?

Ethics disclosures of the executive director or staff are made in writing to the appropriate DES (chair for the executive director and the executive director for staff).

Disclosure forms are found on the ethics website, noted above.

Notices of Potential Violations. Following receipt of a written notice of potential violation, the DES investigates, if necessary, and makes a written determination whether a violation of the Ethics Act could exist or will occur. A DES may seek advice from the Attorney General. If feasible, the DES shall reassign duties to cure a potential violation or direct divestiture or removal by the employee of the personal or financial interests giving rise to the potential violation.

- These disclosures are not required to be made part of the public record.
- A copy of a determination is provided to the employee.
- Both the notice and determination are confidential.

Other Disclosures. The DES also reviews other ethics disclosures and either approves them or determines what action must be taken to avoid a violation of the Act. In addition to the disclosures of certain gifts and interests in the listed state matters, state employees must disclose all outside employment or services for compensation.

The DES must provide a copy of an approved disclosure or other determination the employee.

How Are Third Party Reports of Potential Violations or Complaints Handled?

Any person may report a potential violation of the Ethics Act by a board or commission member or its staff to the appropriate DES or file a complaint alleging actual violations with the Attorney General.

- Notices of potential violations and complaints must be submitted in writing and under oath.
- Notices of potential violations are investigated by the appropriate DES who makes a written determination whether a violation may exist.⁸
- Complaints are addressed by the Attorney General under separate procedures outlined in the Ethics Act.
- These matters are confidential, unless the subject waives confidentiality or the matter results in a public accusation.

What Are The Procedures for Quarterly Reports?

Designated ethics supervisors must submit copies of notices of potential violations received and the corresponding determinations to the Attorney General for review by the state ethics attorney as part of the quarterly report required by the Ethics Act.

- Reports are due in April, July, October and January for the preceding quarter.
- · A sample report may be found on the Department of Law's ethics website.
- An executive director may file a quarterly report on behalf of the chair and combine it with his or her own report.
- If a board or commission does not meet during a quarter and there is no other reportable activity, the DES advises the Department of Law Ethics Attorney by e-mail at ethicsreporting@alaska.gov and no other report is required.

If the state ethics attorney disagrees with a reported determination, the attorney will advise the DES of that finding. If the ethics attorney finds that there was a violation, the member who committed the violation is not liable if he or she fully disclosed all relevant facts reasonably necessary to the ethics supervisor's or commission's determination and acted consistent with the determination.

How Does A DES or Board or Commission Get Ethics Advice?

A DES or board or commission may make a **written request** to the Attorney General for an opinion regarding the application of the Ethics Act. In practice, the Attorney General, through the state ethics attorney, also provides **advice by phone or e-mail** to designated ethics supervisors, especially when time constraints prevent the preparation of timely written opinions.

- A request for advice and the advisory opinion are confidential.
- The ethics attorney endeavors to provide prompt assistance, although that may not always be possible.
- The DES must make his or her determination addressing the potential violation based on the opinion provided.

It is the obligation of each board or commission member, as well as the staff, to ensure that the public's business is conducted in a manner that is consistent with the standards set out in the Ethics Act. We hope this summary assists you in ensuring that your obligations are met.

- ¹ The Act covers a board, commission, authority, or board of directors of a public or quasi-public corporation, established by statute in the executive branch of state government.
- ² The governor has delegated the DES responsibility to Guy Bell, Administrative Director of the Office of the Governor.
- ³ You may supplement the disclosure form with other written explanation as necessary. Your signature on a disclosure certifies that, to the best of your knowledge, the statements made are true, correct and complete. False statements are punishable.
- ⁴ In most, but not all, situations, refraining from participation ensures that a violation of the Ethics Act does not occur. Abstention does not cure a conflict with respect to a significant direct personal or financial interest in a state grant, contract, lease or loan because the Ethics Act prohibition applies whether or not the public officer actually takes official action.
- ⁵ The chair must give a copy of the written determination to the disclosing member. There is a determination form available on the Department of Law's ethics web page. The ethics supervisor may also write a separate memorandum.
- ⁶ In this manner, a member's detailed personal and financial information may be protected from public disclosure.
- ⁷ When a matter of particular sensitivity is raised and the ramifications of continuing without an advisory opinion from the Attorney General may affect the validity of the board or commission's action, the members should consider tabling the matter so that an opinion may be obtained.
- ⁸ The DES provides a copy of the notice to the employee who is the subject of the notice and may seek input from the employee, his or her supervisor and others. The DES may seek advice from the Attorney General. A copy of the DES' written determination is provided to the subject employee and the complaining party. The DES submits a copy of both the notice and the determination to the Attorney General for review as part of the DES' quarterly report. If feasible,

the DES shall reassign duties to cure a potential violation or direct divestiture or removal by the employee of the personal or financial interests giving rise to the potential violation.

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The Attorney General and Department of Law staff may not provide legal advice to private citizens or organizations. Please contact an attorney if you need legal advice. The Alaska Lawyer Referral Service or your local bar association may be able to assist you in locating a lawyer.

4. State & Federal Agency Updates

Brief Discussion:

- -Department of Fish and Game
- -Division of Wildlife Conservation

Darren Bruning, the deputy director for the Division of Wildlife Conservation (DWC), provided an update for the board. He informed the board that their division has 281 positions, that 31 of them were vacant, and that all but five of the vacant positions were in recruitment. He said that they had some impending retirements that would be big losses for the division, but that leadership staff had recently been hired. He said that there were five legislative bills that could affect DWC, which included municipal trapping, illegally seized game, guide concessions on state land, license application fee reduction, and a constitution amendment for world priority. He said that DWC was facing a significant number of legal challenges and that it was taking up a lot of their time. He said that they were working on DWC's FY25 budget and would be requesting slightly more than their FY24 budget. He also said that Pittman Robertson funding had gone down nationwide by 19%, and that they were expecting around seven million dollars less. He informed the board that the Board of Game (BOG) meeting was held the week before this meeting. He said that there were 162 proposals considered by the board. There were 17 proposals related to GMU 19C, sheep proposals were deferred to the next state meeting, and that a sheep working group would be activated to address 19C issues. There were 13 intensive management (IM) proposals. He said that staff and funding for them was becoming limited, and that it needed addressed. He said that there would be additional opportunity to take bears, which included bear baiting. He informed the board that they did not see any moose on the Kenai River last Fall, and that they were expecting a decrease in the reported harvest. He said that the IM program for the Mulchatna Caribou Herd will continue in Spring 2024, which would include the removal of wolves and bears near calving grounds. Mr. Kunder asked if there were any plans to let the public take bears or wolves prior to the IM program going into effect, to which Mr. Bruning said he was not sure, but would get back to the board with an answer. Lastly, he informed the board that they were continuing wood bison restoration. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Bruning for his time.

-Department of Natural Resources -Division of Mining, Land and Water

Dianna Leinberger, a natural resource land manager, in the Northern region, from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Division of Mining, Land and Water (DMLW), was in attendance to provide an update for the board. She informed the board that Jim Wessel, the primary adjudicator for permits for guide-outfitters, transporters, and trapping cabin permits in the Northern region was also in the room if they had any questions for him. She started discussion on legislation. She said that SB253 had been introduced and was a bill created to establish a guide concession program on state land and proposed a pilot project in GMU 19C, with the idea that it later be expanded throughout the state in areas of need. She said that they were also monitoring HB125, which was a bill to issue trapping cabin permits for existing cabins to new people. She informed the board that ATVs/UTVs that weigh between 1,500lbs and 2,500lbs are authorized for use on general state land. Aaron Bloomquist asked her how they deal with bear baiting. She said that they do not get a lot of commercial operators that deal in bear baiting in the Northern region. She said that the confusion comes in when a bear baiting station stays on state land for more than 14 days, which requires land use authorization. She reminded the board that DNR has over-thecounter storage permits, which allows guides to keep their bear baiting equipment in the field outside of the season. Mr. Bloomquist said that the board's frustration with bear baiting had always been that they receive different answers each time the question is asked. He said that it would be nice to have something in writing with clear direction on the topic by their December meeting. As previous bear baiters, Mr. Bloomquist and Mr. Buist offered to help draft something with DNR as board liaisons. Ms. Leinberger said that she would give them her card so they could continue the discussion. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Ms. Leinberger for her time.

-U.S. Forest Service

Jason Anderson, a recreation supervisor for the United States Forest Service (USFS), was in attendance to provide an update for the USFS. Mr. Anderson reminded the board that the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the BGCSB, ADF&G, and the USFS would be expiring soon. He said that the USFS was looking to continue the MOU, which the board agreed. He reminded the board that there was an upcoming prospectus towards the Fall/Winter of 2024, which would issue additional capacity for black bear, brown bear, and mountain goat hunts on the Tongass National Rainforest. Lastly, he said that the collaborative process between big game guides and tourism operators, on small to medium vessels that work in the same area, has worked to reduce conflict in the field and operate effectively. Chairman Bunch thanked him and the USFS for being so open to communication with the guiding industry and said that it has really helped in a lot of different areas. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Anderson for his time.

5. Division Update: Current Fiscal Report

Brief Discussion:

On Record: 10:45 a.m.

The board welcomed the division's administrative operations manager, Melissa Dumas, to the meeting. Ms. Dumas provided the board with their FY24 1st/2nd quarter fiscal reports, which ultimately came to a large surplus, something she said would be reduced over time because of their recent fee changes. Mr. Bloomquist asked if their fee changes that took place the prior year warranted any changes to existing license fees, application fees, etc. Ms. Dumas said that it was too early to tell and that there would be another fee analysis closer to their next renewal to see if any fees needed reduced/increased. Mr. Bloomquist

asked about the legislative bill that removes investigative costs from their program. Ms. Dumas informed the board that there was a bill they were hoping would get passed that would essentially remove investigative costs from programs and instead have those costs paid by excess business licensing and corporations revenue, something that normally goes back to the general fund. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Ms. Dumas for her time.

6. Discussion with Director Robb: Division Annual Expenditures Allowance/Online Self-Service Tools Education

Brief Discussion:

The board welcomed Director Sylvan Robb to the meeting. Chairman Bunch said that one of the most frustrating parts of running such a big board is understanding how money is appropriated to the division and how the board is able to spend their money. He asked her to explain how the legislative expenditure process works. She informed the board that the legislature makes appropriations to all divisions, one for each of them. Each appropriation is broken down into line items the money can be spent on, such as personal services, travel, services, commodities, etc. She said that the division cannot spend more than what is authorized. It would not matter if someone donated millions of dollars to the division and/or board, the legislature would still need to approve it to be accepted and spent. She explained that the division then has to do fee setting for each program, and statute requires the fees to cover the costs of the program without overcharging/undercharging licensees. She said that 88% of their expenditures go to professional licensing, but that there are 45 programs sharing them. The expenditures then go to each program's needs, such as personnel, memberships, legal, travel, general fund, etc. She said that all license fines go to the general fund. Chairman Bunch asked if the general fund money goes back to the division in some form or another, to which she said no. Chairman Bunch asked where the money, in regard to the cost of a regulations project, goes. She said that the cost of a regulations project goes to whoever is coding their time towards the project, and that it depends on how big the regulations project is. In addition to staff time, some of the costs go to notifying the public and their licensees of the regulations project, in an attempt to receive any type of public comment. Chairman Bunch asked how close the division gets to hitting their ceiling on expenditure, to which she said that it varies since the pandemic, due to staffing issues. He asked if the division is able to spend money that is not spent on staffing on other areas of need, to which she said it depends on the line item. She said they can move money around from one line item to another, but that it had to be approved by the Office of Management and Budget. He asked her if there was an avenue to have the board work with the division on next year's budget to promote expenditures of money for a special project, such as something that goes out for bid. She said that if the board wanted to contract for something, it would require the division to do so. She said the procurement process for something, such as the board's current IT project regarding the ability for contracting guides/transporters to upload their own hunt records/transporter activity reports (including the information on the hunt records) into their licensing files, would likely be a lengthy process. She said that, while it might include reaching out for three bids, it might also include possibly soliciting bids for many more, to make sure everyone has a chance to take advantage of government contracts. She suggested that the board continue with the division working on their IT project because she still anticipated it would be the faster route. She said that if they did not, they would need to spend money ensuring that a

contractor got up-to-speed with how their system works, in terms of interfacing. In addition, due to cyber-attacks, a contractor would need to demonstrate that they can meet the State's security requirements. Mr. Bloomquist asked what the board needed to do in order to get travel approved for board members to get to other work-related events, such as BOG meetings. She informed the board that the division puts together a travel plan every fiscal year, which includes all travel for all board members and staff across all programs, and that the division was aware their board wanted to be able to travel to BOG meetings and providing in-person testimony to the legislature. He asked if the board needed to motion to add a board member to the travel plan for BOG meetings, to which she said no, that they just needed to add it, and all other requested travel, to their annual report, which is statutorily due June 30th every year. He asked her how the board can have in-person legal representation at their board meetings, something they used to have at each of their regularly scheduled meetings. He told her that it saves a ton of hours having someone there when they go over regulation projects because they can immediately tell them if what they propose is something they can do. She said that the division has three attorneys that can provide guidance to the division's 45 programs, as well as their corporations/business licensing sections, and that they are not always available. She said that normally the division is happy to help get an attorney to specific portions of a meeting, where value is added to have an attorney there. She suggested the board come up with questions in advance of their meetings where they think they might need legal counsel, so that their attorneys can do some prep in advance. He asked her what they needed to do to have an attorney at their meetings for two days during their meetings where they discuss regulations. She said that they could ensure that everyone's not on leave at that time, but that it would be helpful to know exactly what the board wants from their attorneys, so they are not taking their time unnecessarily, having the board pay for it, and to make sure they are prepared to answer the questions that do come up. She ensured the board that the division is always interested in making sure that the board has the resources it needs to be successful. Mr. Bloomquist said that it is frustrating to spend a lot of time on regulation projects, only to find out later that they cannot do what they were trying to do and hoped that the board could get an attorney approved to be at their next meeting in December. Chairman Bunch said that he really wanted their licensees to be able to a lot more things online, such as applying for GUA registrations. Director Sylvan said that it was high on their list of things to get done, that they were working on getting more and more applications online for all 45 licensing programs, but that it would take some time. Chairman Bunch said that he would be speaking on agenda item "Online Self-Service Tools Education," likely on day three of the meeting instead of right now. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Director Sylvan for her time. The board went to lunch.

Back from lunch, the board continued the meeting. Thor Stacey was not yet available to discuss the APHA update, so the board moved along on the agenda.

9. Investigations Unit

Probation Monitor Report

Brief Discussion:

Investigator Lee Strout was in attendance to provide the report for the probation monitor. Mr. Strout informed the board that there were currently 15 licensees on probation, as of the date of the report, and that two licensees were released from probation since the last report. Two licensees were also out of compliance, both of which had previously been discussed with the board. With nothing left to discuss, the board moved onto their investigative report.

Investigative Report

Brief Discussion:

Investigator Strout provided the board with their investigative report, which was for the period of November 28, 2023, thru March 20, 2024. He informed the board that there were 70 open cases and that 37 closed since their last report. Chairman Bunch asked what trends he was seeing, which he replied that a lot of cases were application involved due to "YES" answers under the Professional Fitness Questions (PFQs) sections of the initial and renewal applications. He said that there was a little bit of an uptick from the troopers, which mainly included the taking of sublegal animals. He also said that he had not recently seen many conflicts in the field cases, which is a reduction from the past. The board discussed the application problem and maybe changing the PFQs to be more specific, so they do not have so many applicants not answering "YES" when they should have. With nothing left to discuss, and Mr. Stacey having shown up, the board moved onto the APHA update.

10. APHA Update

Brief Discussion:

Thor Stacey, the Alaska Professional Hunters Association's (APHAs) Director of Government Affairs, introduced himself and thanked the board for having him. He asked if the board had any specific questions for him. Chairman Bunch asked him to speak to the issues that APHA was tackling on behalf of its membership. Mr. Stacey said that APHA was monitoring various bills in the legislature that affect hunting and fishing. He said that they were working in support of the reauthorization of the board, the executive administrator position for the BGCSB, SB253, which would be the result of the task force efforts that the BGCSB led to develop a recommendation for hunting guide concessions on state land, as well as the reauthorization of the Citizen's Advisory Commission on Federal Areas (CACFA). He said that they just attended to the BOG meeting in Kotzebue, and that the main issue was the declining Western Arctic Caribou Herd. He said that federal land managers had closed federal lands in the herd's range but that state lands remained open. He said that the decline had gotten to the point to where there may not be a surplus for uses that are not subsistence. He said there was a lot of discussion between stakeholders in the NANA region and the North Slope region, as well as discussions with the APHA and others. At the end of the discussion, the BOG capped the number of nonresidents in the area, which resulted in guiding for caribou in that portion of the state as pretty much gone. He said that the BOG did not take action on any of the sheep proposals in 19C, and that they postponed the discussion until their next statewide meeting with the hope that there would be a management program in place to assist with the issue. He informed the board that APHA had been involved in litigation in a number of federal issues, including certain rules that would affect hunting in Alaska. He said that there was a proposal to add seats to

the Federal Subsistence Board, with all three of them being tribally aligned. He encouraged the BGCSB to watch the arguments held in front of the State Supreme Court, in the Robert Castle vs. SOA BOG litigation case, that was held about a month before this meeting, which APHA was allowed to provide arguments at, because it is very informative for everybody involved in the industry. Chairman Bunch asked if APHA needed anything from the board regarding current legislation, to which Mr. Stacey answered that a letter supporting SB253 would be helpful, and that the legislature would be surprised if they did not provide one. With nothing left to discuss, the board thanked Mr. Stacey for his time. The board took a break

Consent Agreement Review Panel

Brief Discussion:

Back from break, the board began discussion on possibly creating a consent agreement review panel, which would be a four-person panel reviewing guide-related investigative cases and provide consent agreement recommendations to the board. Chairman Bunch said that the reason for the discussion is because the board has a very large number of cases that take a long time to review, and that only licensed guides on the board review them. Mr. Bloomquist said that this was his idea and reassured the audience that the review panel would not make any board decisions, and that the cases would still be discussed at the board level, with the ultimate decision being a board decision. The board asked what Mr. Strout (their investigator) needed from them to get things started, to which he said he needed something in writing from the board specifying what they are asking for. He thought the discussion was going to be a review panel comprised of board members and told them that having non-boarded guides reviewing cases would be a really tough hurdle to get over because of perceived conflicts of interest, actual conflicts of interest, and the legality of the request. He said that he understands that the board needs help reviewing cases and suggested that maybe the board expand seats on the board to help review them. The board discussed the topic but said it would be difficult to add seats on the board because it would require a statute change. The board discussed possibly having all board members, not just licensed guides on the board, review guide-related cases. Mr. Strout said that the reason that licensed guides on the board review guiderelated cases is because they have the knowledge required to review them. He said that, if the board had a non-licensed guide on the board review guide-related cases, they would be attacked in court because they would not have the knowledge that a guide does. The board decided to discuss the matter later in the meeting, with the intention of approving a letter that would go to investigations. With nothing left to discuss, the board moved onto their next agenda item.

Matrix Review and Update - Add Sublegal Harvest Criteria

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch said that there had been a lot of sublegal harvests recently, mostly by assistant guides. He said that, for the first time, a decision was made by a reviewing board member, to restrict an assistant guide, through a consent agreement, to be able to guide for a species they had a sublegal harvest on until they had successful harvests while guiding with another licensed guide, essentially making them a packer for that species until they can prove they can harvest legally on that species. Mr. Buist said that he really liked the approach because it put responsibility not only on the assistant guide, but on the contracting guide as well. Chairman Bunch asked Mr. Strout how they add the process to the board's matrix, to which he said that they would need to draft something that would

He said that, after the bill was introduced, he went to Juneau personally and talked to Senator Kaufman about the legality of the bill, asking how they got the language in the bill because it was not the language provided by the Big Game	

Commercial Services Board. He said that Senator Kaufman said it was the language came from the task force and the APHA, and that they were a little upset and rewriting the bill. He said that, during the board's last winter meeting, each board member said that the GCP should have nothing to do with DNR regulating guides. He said that, at the last GCP meeting, the chairman said that they just needed to get the bill through, no matter if it is run through ADF&G, DNR, or whomever it ends up with. He said that there was a lot of conflicting information that the board had presented, and that the current iteration included the commissioner of ADF&G having the decision-making authority over how many guides would be in each concession area. He said that he was asked by several guides, at the BOG meeting, why RHAK could not support the GCP, and told them that it does not really limit guides. He said that RHAK discussed the possibility of supporting a program that would help, and that they concluded that if it were like the federal concession program it would help avoid the crowding and conflicts in the field, while also reducing the number of nonresident hunters in the field. He said that the senator and his staff had no idea about the formerly proposed GCP through DNR. He said that the current GCP also does not have a fiscal note attached to it, and that when there is one attached to it, the legislature likely will not like the cost. He suggested that the board either limit guide use areas or break current guide use areas into smaller areas. He said that APHA came out last week, on the record, stating that they would never support draw hunts for nonresident sheep hunters because it does not support guide-related businesses. He asked, "How do other guides in the lower 48s survive? How do guides that are currently operating on lands that have draw permits, how do they survive?" In his experience, he said that most of them have other businesses to fall back on. He said that if guides continue to only support a GCP then how do they expect RHAK to ever come to a compromise with them on anything else. Mr. Kunder said that he has only ever heard of RHAK discussing sheep issues and asked Mr. Richards if they supported other species, to which he said yes, they are in support of all species, and that the only reason he kept bringing up sheep is because it was the main reason behind discussion of creating the GCP. Chairman Bunch clarified that, if he said that he did not care who runs the program and that they just needed to get it through, in regard to the GCP being approved through legislation, it was out of context. He said that the workgroup discussed who should run the program and came to the realization that it needed to either be the Division of Corporations, Business and Professional licensing (CBPL) or DNR. After reviewing a draft for both options, and through a law review, it was more appropriate to have DNR run the program, and that the decision was a culmination of everything the workgroup's efforts. He also wanted to clarify that he had been in pleasant discussions with the legislature, and that they knew the GCP bill needed amended but only had 12 hours to get it filed, so they filed it as it was at the time. With nothing left to discuss the board thanked Mr. Richards for his testimony.

Virgil Umphenour

Virgil Umphenour, a master guide-outfitter, said that, in response to Mr. Richard's testimony, he had had served three terms on the Board of Fisheries and not once did anyone of the Board of Game want to go to the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (WAFWA), and that the commissioner had him represent both fishing and wildlife in Alaska, due to him being a hunting guide. He said that during his last time attending the WAFWA annual event, he went on a tour of the Deseret Ranch, a 2,000-acre ranch in Utah. He said that the ranch cut back on half of the beef and sheep, did habitat restoration, and focused on guiding. He said that Utah, along with many states have landowner tags, but

also allow subsistence hunters to hunt substandard animals on their land (not trophy animals) while landowners received all the trophy permits, which is how guides in other states survive. He said that he attended the BOG meeting and that they provided a good presentation on the current state of sheep in Alaska. He said that even with all of the sheep population depressed in the Alaska Range and the Brooks Range and having them required to be sealed, while also meticulously aging them, over half the sheep taken were legal the previous year. He said that this meant that, even with the overcrowding of guides, it is not as blown up as much as RHAK wants you to think.

Mr. Umphenour informed the board that there was a massive decline in king salmon and coho salmon returning to the rivers in Alaska and a massive decline in spawning. He brought this up because fish is one of the main sources of food for wolves and bears. He said that, with the decline of fish, the next food source for wolves and bears are calves, so it is going to and likely already is declining the number of animals in the field. He said that the cause is the fish hatcheries in Alaska, which primarily hatch pink salmon and chum salmon. The board thanked Mr. Umphenour for his testimony.

Zach Decker

Zach Decker, a registered guide-outfitter, began testimony on the proposed regulation requiring a sticker on transporter/guide aircraft and vessels. He said that the sticker should only be for transporters and not for guides, and that it should include all vessels and aircraft. He said that the problem, and reason for the proposed regulation, began with transporters being identified in the field, and that it has now turned into a service-type regulation for all licensees. He said that another problem is the 12-inch numbers that would be required to be put on aircraft/vessels. Who's license numbers would be put on the side of the aircraft/vessels? Would it be the contracting guide? Would it be the assistant guide who's in the field with the client? Would it be the transporter, if one is hired by a contracting guide? Chairman Bunch informed him that the regulation was not complete and that he had made changes regarding the stickers that the board would review later in the meeting. The board thanked Mr. Decker for his testimony.

Thor Stacey

Thor Stacey provided public comment on behalf of the APHA, in regard to the GCP. He said that APHA first had to grapple with where the program was going to be run. They were excited that the task force was formed with impartial members from various backgrounds and diverse perspectives, including agency members, a BGCSB member, a licensed guide, and a public member, to address the problems on state land. He said that there were a lot of compromises APHA had with the GCP being formed. He said that APHA had hoped that the GCP would be run through ADF&G or DCCED but understood that legally the program was safer in DNR. He said that the second big compromise is that the program is not designed to be statewide. APHA had always wanted a statewide GCP but came to a compromise because of the substantive testimony from guides and public members describing not having problems in their areas, while at the same time other testimony described significant problems in other areas on state land. They saw that the task force heard those diverse viewpoints and looked at creating a program that would target problem areas instead of a blanket implantation on all state land around the state. As for transferability, he said that the APHA could not get behind a program that did not at least have emergency transfer provisions in case of guides having significant health issues or passing away, which includes a transitional period that can be very difficult to deal with. They appreciated that the task force made a recommendation that was legally sound,

allowing businesses to be sold along with permits for concessions, but that, after the end of the term of the permit, the permit would go back out for bid, providing an equal opportunity for everybody to compete for it. He finished with the topic of entitlement versus stewardship. He said that right now a licensed guide is entitled to access to state land. The APHA has always been very consistent that they support a stewardship approach to access to state land, meaning a guide is incentivized to do the right thing, including not having conflict with substance users, resident hunters, other land users, and that there is some ability for them to lose their land access or not be awarded land access based on a history of compliance. The board thanked Mr. Stacey for his testimony. The board decided to take a break.

Brief Discussion:

Back from break, the board began discussion on current workgroups and the formation of new committees/workgroups.

Exams

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch said that the RGO written exam had been updated. He said that there are a lot of questions on the exam and that the board was thinking about adding an online hunter/safety course with an exit exam as a prerequisite to sit for the RGO written exam, which would allow them to get the exam down to 100 questions. He said that he was still working on the Game Management Unit (GMU) exams, which are a bit outdated. He said that, in his opinion, they should just get rid of the GMU exams completely and require an applicant to have more time in the field within the unit and use hunt records to confirm that days in the field. However, he said that change would require a statute change, which would be difficult. He suggested that they just update the exams now and think about his idea in the future.

Transporters

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch said that the transporter workgroup was almost concluded and that the last discussion needed was the matter earlier discussed in the meeting regarding the addition of 12 AAC 75.405. Marking of Aircraft and Vessels Used by Guides and Transporters (the discussion will take place later in this meeting). He updated the board regarding the Kodiak AC Transporter Subcommittee, informing them that the number of transporters in the area had doubled and that they were not respecting the local users there. He said that the subcommittee was following the board's transporter regulation projects and would attend the December 2024 meeting to provide public comment. He said that they had a few problems with the regulation projects. They wanted to make sure that transporters providing overnight services is not segued to just large vessels. They were also likely to provide comment on drop offs on tidelands and below mean high water mark lands.

Concession Program

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch said that Thor Stacey covered the GCP very well during his earlier discussions and that if anybody wanted to learn more about discussions during the meetings, all of the meeting minutes from the task force are on the BGCSB website.

Workgroup for Jason Bunch

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch said that he would like the board to think about topics that he can help them out with, since he would no longer be on the board after this meeting. He said that he would like to continue with the exams workgroup and that, if the board wanted, he would continue working in some aspect regarding concessions, on behalf of the board. He clarified that he would not make any decisions for the board, but just work as a liaison.

Before the board finished with workgroup updates, Mr. Bloomquist reminded the board that he was tasked with working on legislative projects. He said that the board had a number of projects currently in legislation and that the other projects would have to wait. Speaking on legislation, Chairman Bunch said that the board should make survivorship a top priority. With nothing left to discuss, the board moved onto their next agenda item.

5. Ongoing Task List Review

Transporter Information Letter

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch reminded the board that they thought their regulations project would be going onto the next stage of the regulations process, public comment, right around this meeting, but they were not ready yet. He also reminded the board that Mike Flores was tasked with writing a transporter information letter entailing the changes that would take place if the regulation projects were adopted as law. He informed the board that the division did not want to send the letter out because of a few reasons. It would cause a lot of transporters to reach out to the division regarding something that may not happen and cause confusion among licensees. Also, the public comment period is there to provide information to all licensees, so the information would already go out to transporters and allow them to provide feedback. Chairman Bunch informed the board that he learned that they could do a 90-day public notice if they wanted to, and attach the letter to the notice, which would provide transporters the amount of time needed to address anything they needed to. He said that he spoke with the division on having a Facebook page and, that at first, they were not interested. He said that he thinks that they can still get it done, that it would be a platform consisting of up-to-date information for the public such as reminders to renew GUAs or providing deadlines, and that comments would be disabled.

Education Letter for Hunt Planners and Booking Agents

Brief Discussion:

The board discussed the issue of hunt planners and booking agents, both of which they do not have legislative authority to regulate. They discussed writing a letter to the Department of Law (LAW), informing them of what is happening and getting advice on what they can do moving forward without being able to regulate them. Chairman Bunch asked the board if they wanted to keep the education letter on the task list, to which they agreed. Mr. Bloomquist said that maybe they should have a meeting with LAW to address the issue, to which the board agreed.

6. Public Comment

Brief Discussion:

Ahead of schedule, Chairman Bunch opened public comment back up for a few people in the room.

Chris Zwolinski

Christ Zwolinski, a master guide-outfitter, said that he thinks the GCP should be statewide and not doing so is going to cause issues. He said that he thinks that guides should be limited on how many animals they can take because it is a public source, and everybody

Dick Rohrer	should have access to it. He said that he really liked the idea of putting 12-inch numbers on aircraft because of illegally run outfits in the state, and that it would hold them to the same standard as all other guides. He said that he did not want to get rid of the \$300 annual filing fee because it went into the board's funds, which pays for things such as attorney fees. Chairman Bunch asked him if he was in attendance the previous day, to which he was not, so he informed him of the conversation the board had with Director Sylvan Robb on legislative authority and the ability to spend the money their program has. The board thanked Mr. Zwolinski for his time. Dick Rohrer, a master guide-outfitter, said that the big unknown with their budget is how much money is spent on LAW when a case goes to a hearing. He said that, after reviewing the board's fiscal reports over the years, sometimes LAW costs run upwards of \$250,000 and sometimes quite a bit less than that. He asked the board to support the governor's bill, SB225, and HB314, which address these types of fees being paid through other means
	instead of their budget. The board thanked Mr. Rohrer for his testimony. The board went

Coke Wallace	Coke Wallace, a master guide-outfitter, mentioned that he was on the GCP and thanked everybody for putting their time and effort into the work group. He specifically thanked Chairman Bunch for all of his work, not only on the GCP, but with the board. He said that it was a grave mistake to term him out of his seat on the board but understood that it was statutorily required and that he needed the break. He said that, regarding the GCP, he thought guides were very cooperative and tried to compromise with RHAK. He said that nonresident hunters pay for more than 80% of the game management in the state and, overall, only take about 11% of the animals, although they do well with sheep hunts. He said that part of the problem with more sheep being taken by nonresidents versus residents is that nonresidents usually spend more time in the field to get the sheep. He gave an example of nonresidents staying out in the field 10-14 days versus a resident staying out in the field 3-4 days. He also said a big problem with the sheep issue is that it is not being managed to the best of the state's ability. He said that he thinks that the GCP should include the entire state but understood that starting in problem areas would be a good start, but that starting in one area would only push guides into the surrounding areas. The board thanked Mr. Wallace for his testimony.
Dan Montgomery	Dan Montgomery, a master guide-outfitter, said that he did not think the marking of aircraft and vessels was necessary, that it would not make a difference at all, and that it is just another regulation that can easily be violated. He said that guides should be eliminated entirely from the marking of aircraft and vessels because the problem arose from a transporter issue. 2. Alaska Wildlife Troopers

Brief Discussion:	Major Aaron Frenzel, from the Alaska Wildlife Troopers (AWT), introduced himself. He said
	that AWT had some recent retirements, and their numbers were a little bit low, but they
	had recruits coming in. He said that their vacancies were staying about even. He said that
	some new posts came on within the last year, including Galena. He said that they are
	looking to get posts in Nome and St. Mary's. He said there are a lot of problems in St.
	Mary's and surrounding villages because people are operating as licensed transporters and
	likely acting as registered guide-outfitters. He informed the board that they got a few more
	helicopters based around the state. Mr. Buist asked if the clientele of the unlicensed
	transporters were residents or nonresidents, to which Major Frenzel said that quite a few
	of them had been nonresidents. Mr. Buist asked if they looked into how these people are

	really that close on the annuli or if there was favoritism. He responded that a lot of it
	depends on the district attorney and if they think the case would be prosecuted
	successfully. He said that the AWT trooper that testified brought up a case where the
	biologist and the tech disagreed on a sheep, with one saying it was seven years old and
	one saying it was eight. The judge asked the department if they could definitively tell him if
	the sheep was seven or eight years old, which they could not without cutting the horn in
	half, something the defendant did not agree to do. He said that this is an example of how it
	is tough for DAs to prosecute sheep that teeter on the line of sublegal and legal. He said
	that the big problem seems to be that a lot of people are only counting annuli for age of
	sheep. Chairman Bunch said that, if you look at the big picture, with all of the numbers of
	legal sheep taken versus the sublegal sheep taken in 2022, between seven and eight
	percent of the total number was sublegal sheep, and about three to four percent of that
	was from guided hunts. He said that there is always going to be human error and that
	three to four percent is not really that bad in the grand scheme of things. The board
	thanked Mr. Richard for his testimony.
Dick Rohrer	Dick Rohrer, a master guide-outfitter, said that he wanted to put on the record and
	acknowledge the loss of one of their professional members, Joe Klutsch, who passed away
	a few weeks prior. He said that the industry is certainly going to miss the historic
	perspective he always brought to the board and industry. He said that it points out once
	again the need for consideration of survivorship/emergency regulations from time to time.
	He said that wanted to point out what happened in Joe Klutsch's situation. He had hunters

Brief Discussion:	Pete Buist, the board's liaison for the Wood Bison Reintroduction Planning Team, provided an update for the board. He said that there was a plan to reintroduce 40 yearlings in Minto Flats, but that it was met acrimoniously. He said that they narrowed down where the bison would initially be put, closer South of the Tanana River and closer to the Kantishna River. While that is a good spot to start, he said that they do not likely stay where you put them, so they are likely to move. document was 'Alaska Guide Pilots.' In summary, the document says that Congress passed a resolution in 2000 that established operating rules for Alaska guide pilots, and that, historically, the enforcement policy considered flights made by pilots and guides as incidental to their underlying hunting, guiding, or fishing business, where lodging was also provided. In 2020, Congress intervened due to litigation concerning long-term enforcement policies in Alaska and directed the FAA should not regulate lodge and guide operations under Part 135 if those operation meet specific criteria listed in the document. The recommended action is for pilots in command to evaluate their operations considering the statutory and regulatory framework outlined in the document, and that operators and pilots are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the regulatory requirements of Parts 119 and 135 to ensure compliance. Mr. Boniek said that 'incidental' is the key word in the document. To answer the inquiry from the guide who reached out to the division, when asked if whether a lodge could do transporting for a guide's clients, the answer is no, because hauling his customers is not incidental to the lodge's business, unless the lodge owner was also a transporter or was an air taxi that did not charge more than the usual tariff or charter rate for the carriage of big game hunters, their equipment, or big game animals harvested by hunters, per AS 08.54.790(12)(B)(i).

State Park Fees for Transporters

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch informed the board that state parks used to handle transporters, that were dropping clients off on state park land, while providing overnight accommodations while anchored, like water taxis, charging a daily fee per client. They recently changed their fee schedule to include these types of transporters and would charge them the same amount, per client (\$300), as they charge for clients of registered guide-outfitters that sleep on the actual land. He said that it was brought to his attention and that he put a lot of thought into it, ultimately coming to the decision that he does not think that it is in the purview of the board to fight for fee schedules. He said that transporters are welcome to collectively get together and have a sit down with the state parks and articulate their position, but it is not the board's responsibility. However, he said that state parks are referring to transporters as transporter-outfitters, which he was not happy with. He said that outfitters cannot outfit and informed the board that he wrote them a letter advising them that their language conflicts with the board's statutes/regulations. He said that he did not take a stance on the topic and that the letter was just informational.

Website Changes, Updated GUA Maps, Delete Assistant Guide Schools Information

Brief Discussion:

Chairman Bunch reminded the board that there was outdated assistant guide schools information on the board's website and that it was going to be taken off.

Mr. Bay and Chairman Bunch went over the process of signing up for a MY LICENSE account. Chairman Bunch shared his screen and showed everyone what it looks like from a licensee's point of view. - Sec. 08.54.591. CREATION AND MEMBERSHIP OF BOARD. (a) For the purposes of licensing and regulating the activities of providers of commercial services to big game hunters in the interest of the state's wildlife resources, there is created the Big Game Commercial Services Board. For administrative purposes, the board is in the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development.
 - (b) The board consists of nine members as follows:
 - (1) two members who are current, licensed registered guide-outfitters;
 - (2) two members who are licensed transporters;
- (3) one member of the Board of Game who is chosen by the Board of Game and who does not hold a guide or transport license;
- (4) two members who represent private landholders affected by guided hunting activities or transportation services and who do not hold a license issued under this chapter; and
 - (5) two public members.
- **Sec. 08.54.595. BOARD ASSISTANCE.** State agencies shall provide the board with information, data, or technical assistance requested by the board for the purposes of licensing and regulating the activities of providers of commercial services to big game hunters.

Sec. 08.54.600. DUTIES OF BOARD. (a) The board shall

- (1) prepare and grade
- (A) a qualification examination for a registered guide-outfitter license that requires demonstration that the applicant is qualified generally to provide guided and outfitted hunts and, in particular, possesses knowledge of fishing, hunting, and guiding laws and regulations; and
- (B) a certification examination for each game management unit in which the registered guide-outfitter intends to provide big game hunting services; the examination must require demonstration that the registered guide-outfitter is qualified to provide guided and outfitted hunts in the game management unit for which the registered guide-outfitter seeks to be certified and, in particular, must require demonstration that the registered guide-outfitter possesses knowledge of the terrain, transportation problems, game, and other characteristics of the game management unit;
- (2) authorize the issuance of registered guide-outfitter, master guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, assistant guide, and transporter licenses after the applicant for the license satisfies the requirements for the license;
 - (3) impose appropriate disciplinary sanctions on a licensee under AS 08.54.600 08.54.790;
- (4) require an applicant for issuance or renewal of any class of guide license or of a transporter license to state in a written and signed document whether the applicant's right to obtain, or exercise the privileges granted by, a hunting, guiding, outfitting, or transportation services license is revoked or suspended in this state or another state or in Canada;
- (5) regularly disseminate information regarding examinations and other qualifications for all classes of guide licenses to residents of the rural areas of the state;

- (6) adopt procedural and substantive regulations required by this chapter;
- (7) provide for administration of examinations for registered guide-outfitters at least twice a year;
- (8) meet at least twice annually.
- (b) The board shall provide for administration of an oral examination for a registered guide-outfitter license or for a game management unit certification if requested at the time of application for the license.
- (c) In addition to the regulations required under (a) of this section, the board may adopt regulations the board considers appropriate, including regulations to
 - (1) establish a code of ethics for professions regulated by the board;
- (2) establish requirements for the contents of written contracts to provide big game hunting services and transportation services to clients;
- (3) authorize the department to request a copy of a big game hunting services or transportation services contract entered into by a person licensed under this chapter.
- **Sec. 08.54.605. ELIGIBILITY FOR LICENSES.** (a) Notwithstanding AS 08.54.610, 08.54.620, 08.54.630, 08.54.650, and 08.54.660, a person may not receive, hold, or renew a registered guide-outfitter license, master guide-outfitter license, class-A assistant guide license, assistant guide license, or transporter license if
 - (1) the person has been convicted of
- (A) a violation of a state or federal hunting, guiding, or transportation services statute or regulation for which
 - (i) the person was imprisoned for more than five days within the previous five years;
 - (ii) an unsuspended fine of more than \$2,000 was imposed in the previous 12 months;
 - (iii) an unsuspended fine of more than \$3,000 was imposed in the previous 36 months; or
 - (iv) an unsuspended fine of more than \$5,000 was imposed in the previous 60 months;
 - (B) a felony within the last five years; or
 - (C) a felony offense against the person under AS 11.41 within the last 10 years; or
- (2) the person's right to obtain, or exercise the privileges granted by, a hunting, guiding, outfitting, or transportation services license is suspended or revoked in this state or another state or in Canada.
- (b) Notwithstanding (a) of this section, (a)(1)(B) and (C) of this section are not applicable to offenses committed by a person who receives or received any class of guide license or a transporter license under sec. 13, ch 33, SLA 1996, if the offense was committed before May 23, 1996. This subsection does not apply when a person applies for a license that is different from the class of guide license or the transporter license received under sec. 13, ch 33, SLA 1996.
- (c) A person may not receive a certification for a game management unit if the person is prohibited by (a) of this section from receiving or renewing a registered guide-outfitter license or master guide-outfitter license.
- **Sec. 08.54.608. RETIRED STATUS LICENSE.** (a) On retiring from guiding or outfitting, or both, and on payment of an appropriate one-time fee, an individual who has held a license issued under AS 08.54.610, 08.54.620, or 08.54.630 that has not been suspended or revoked under AS 08.54.710 may apply for a retired status license. The retired status license shall indicate whether the individual was licensed as a master guide-outfitter, registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide. An individual holding a retired status license may not guide, outfit, or take charge of a camp in the state under the retired status license. A retired status license is valid for the life of the license holder and does not require renewal.
- (b) An individual with a retired status license issued under (a) of this section may apply for a new registered guide-outfitter license under AS 08.54.610, a new class-A assistant guide license under AS 08.54.620, or a new assistant guide license under AS 08.54.630.
- Sec. 08.54.610. REGISTERED GUIDE-OUTFITTER LICENSE. (a) A natural person is entitled to a registered guide-outfitter license if the person
 - (1) is 21 years of age or older;
- (2) has practical field experience in the handling of firearms, hunting, judging trophies, field preparation of meat and trophies, first aid, photography, and related guiding and outfitting activities;
 - (3) either
 - (A) has passed the qualification examination prepared by the board under AS 08.54.600; or
- (B) provides evidence of 25 years of experience as a class-A assistant guide or class-A assistant guideoutfitter;
- (4) has passed a certification examination prepared by the board under AS 08.54.600 for at least one game management unit;
- (5) has legally hunted big game in the state for part of each of any five years in a manner directly contributing to the person's experience and competency as a guide;
- (6) has been licensed as and performed the services of a class-A assistant guide or assistant guide, or of a class-A assistant guide-outfitter or assistant guide-outfitter under former AS 08.54.300 08.54.590, in the state for a part of each of three years;
 - (7) is capable of performing the essential duties associated with guiding and outfitting;

- (8) has been favorably recommended in writing by eight big game hunters whose recommendations have been solicited by the department from a list provided by the applicant, including at least two favorable recommendations for each year of any three years during which the person was a class-A assistant guide or assistant guide, or a class-A assistant guide-outfitter or assistant guide-outfitter under former AS 08.54.300 08.54.590;
 - (9) has provided proof of financial responsibility if required by the department under AS 08.54.680; and
- (10) has applied for a registered guide-outfitter license on a form provided by the department and paid the license application fee and the registered guide-outfitter license fee.
- (b) A master guide-outfitter license authorizes a registered guide-outfitter to use the title master guide-outfitter, but is for all other purposes under this chapter a registered guide-outfitter license. A natural person is entitled to receive a renewable master guide-outfitter license if the person
- (1) is, at the time of application for a master guide-outfitter license, licensed as a registered guide-outfitter under this section;
- (2) has been licensed in this state as a registered guide or a guide-outfitter, under former AS 08.54.010 08.54.240, former AS 08.54.300 08.54.590, or this chapter, for at least 15 of the last 20 years, including the year immediately preceding the year in which the person applies for a master guide-outfitter license;
- (3) submits a list to the department of at least 45 clients for whom the person has personally provided guiding or outfitting services and the person receives a favorable evaluation from 30 of the clients selected from the list by the department;
- (4) has not been convicted of an offense under AS 08.54.720(a) or a similar law in another jurisdiction related to hunting or to the provision of big game hunting or transportation services within the five years preceding the date of the application for which
 - (A) the person was imprisoned for more than one day; or
 - (B) an unsuspended fine of more than \$1,500 was imposed;
- (5) has not had a hunting, guiding, outfitting, transporter, or similar license suspended or revoked in this state or another jurisdiction within the five years preceding the date of the application; and
- (6) applies for a master guide-outfitter license on a form provided by the department and pays the application fee, if any.
- (c) A registered guide-outfitter may contract to guide or outfit hunts for big game and may provide transportation services, personally or through an assistant, to big game hunters who are clients of the registered guide-outfitter.
- (d) Notwithstanding AS 08.54.750, a person who is licensed as a registered guide-outfitter may be employed by another registered guide-outfitter to provide the services of
- (1) a class-A assistant guide in a game management unit if the registered guide-outfitter providing the services of a class-A assistant guide is able to demonstrate, to the satisfaction of the board, adequate knowledge of and experience in the game management unit; and
 - (2) an assistant guide in any game management unit.
- (e) A registered guide-outfitter who contracts for a guided hunt shall be primarily in the field supervising and participating in the contracted hunt. The contracting registered guide-outfitter shall also conduct the hunt, unless the hunt, under regulations adopted by the board, is being conducted by a class-A assistant guide or a registered guide-outfitter employed by the contracting registered guide-outfitter.

Sec. 08.54.620. CLASS-A ASSISTANT GUIDE LICENSE. (a) A natural person is entitled to a class-A assistant guide license if the person

- (1) is 21 years of age or older;
- (2) applies for a class-A assistant guide license on a form provided by the department and pays the license application fee and the license fee;
 - (3) possesses a current first aid card issued by the Red Cross or a similar organization; and
 - (4) either
 - (A) has
 - been employed during at least three calendar years as any class of licensed guide in the game management unit for which the license is sought; and
 - (ii) at least 10 years' hunting experience in the state; military service outside of the state for not more than three years shall be accepted as part of the required 10 years' hunting experience;
 - (B) provides
 - (i) evidence that the person physically resides in the game management unit in which the person is to be employed;
 - (ii) evidence that the person has had at least 15 years' hunting experience in the game management unit in which the person is to be employed; military service outside of the state for not more than three years shall be accepted as part of the required 15 years' hunting experience; and
 - (iii) a written recommendation from a registered guide-outfitter who intends to employ the person as a class-A assistant guide; or
 - (C) provides evidence that the person
 - (i) physically resides in the game management unit in which the person is to be employed;

- (ii) has at least 10 years' hunting experience in the state; military service outside of the state for not more than three years shall be accepted as part of the required 10 years' hunting experience; and
- (iii) has passed a class-A assistant guide training course approved by the board.
- (b) A class-A assistant guide
 - (1) may not contract to guide or outfit a big game hunt;
- (2) shall be employed by and under the supervision of a registered guide-outfitter who has contracted with the client for whom the class-A assistant guide is conducting the hunt;
- (3) may take charge of a camp and provide guide services from the camp without the contracting registered guide-outfitter being in the field and participating in the contracted hunt if the contracting registered guide-outfitter is supervising the guiding activities;
- (4) may not perform functions of a class-A assistant guide outside of the game management unit for which the license is issued; and
- (5) may be employed by a registered guide-outfitter to perform the functions of an assistant guide in any game management unit.

Sec. 08.54.630. ASSISTANT GUIDE LICENSE. (a) A natural person is entitled to an assistant guide license if the person

- (1) is 18 years of age or older;
- (2) has legally hunted big game in the state during two calendar years;
- (3) possesses a first aid card issued by the Red Cross or a similar organization;
- (4) either
- (A) obtains a written recommendation from a registered guide-outfitter who intends to employ the person as an assistant guide; or
 - (B) provides evidence that the person passed an assistant guide training course approved by the board; and
- (5) applies for an assistant guide license on a form provided by the department and pays the license application fee and the license fee.
 - (b) An assistant guide
 - (1) may not contract to guide or outfit a big game hunt;
- (2) shall be employed by a registered guide-outfitter and under the supervision of a registered guide-outfitter or class-A assistant guide while the assistant guide is in the field on guided hunts; and
- (3) may not take charge of a camp or provide guide services unless the contracting registered guide-outfitter is in the field and participating in the contracted hunt or a registered guide-outfitter or class-A assistant guide employed by the contracting guide is physically present and supervising the hunt.

Sec. 08.54.635. DELEGATION OF SERVICES; TRAINING. (a) A registered guide-outfitter who contracts to guide a big game hunt may, under regulations adopted by the board, delegate to a person not licensed under this chapter the services of

- (1) packing, preparing, salvaging, or caring for a client's meat;
- (2) packing trophies; and
- (3) packing camping equipment.
- (b) For training purposes established by the board in regulation, a person who is not licensed under this chapter may assist in providing the guide services of field preparation of trophies, stalking, pursuing, tracking, killing, or attempting to kill big game, and using guiding or outfitting equipment, including spotting scopes and firearms, for the benefit of a hunter. An unlicensed person may only assist in providing a guide service under this subsection if a licensed registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide is physically present and the class-A assistant guide or assistant guide is employed by and under the supervision of the registered guide-outfitter who contracted for the big game hunt.
- (c) A person who does not hold a license issued under this chapter may provide or assist in providing the services identified under this section only if the person meets requirements adopted by the board. A person who provides or assists in providing guide services under this section may receive compensation for providing the services.

Sec. 08.54.640. LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS AND GAME BIOLOGISTS. (a) Notwithstanding AS 08.54.610 - 08.54.630 and except as provided in (b) of this section, a person may not hold, or earn experience credits to apply for, a registered guide-outfitter license under this chapter, while the person is a law enforcement officer and for three months after terminating the person's status as a law enforcement officer.

(b) A registered guide-outfitter license, class-A assistant guide license, or assistant guide license issued under this chapter, or under former provisions of AS 08.54.300 - 08.54.590, after May 16, 1992, is suspended if the person to whom the license is issued subsequently becomes a law enforcement officer. A person whose license is subject to suspension under this subsection shall notify the department that the person has become a law enforcement officer within 30 days after becoming a law enforcement officer. The suspension of a license under this subsection remains in effect until three months have elapsed from the date on which the licensee provides written notification to the department of the fact that the person is no longer a law enforcement officer. A person whose license is suspended

under this subsection is not required to renew the license or pay license renewal fees for the period of suspension. Once a suspension of a license is terminated, the licensee may provide, without further payment of a guide license fee, the guide services authorized by the license for the remainder of the licensing period in which the suspension is terminated. Notwithstanding other provisions of this subsection, if a person whose license is suspended under this subsection fails to notify the department within one year after the person is no longer a law enforcement officer, the person's license lapses and the person is eligible for reissuance of the license only as provided in AS 08.54.670. The board may adopt regulations to implement this subsection.

- (c) A person who holds any class of guide license and who is employed by the Department of Fish and Game or a federal wildlife management agency may not, while employed by the department or agency as a game or wildlife biologist and for 12 months after leaving employment with the department or agency as a game or wildlife biologist, engage in providing big game hunting services in a game management unit in which the person conducted game or wildlife management or research activities for the department or agency at any time during the preceding 12 months.
 - (d) In this section, "law enforcement officer" means a person who is
- (1) employed by the Department of Public Safety as a state trooper or as a law enforcement officer engaged in fish and wildlife protection; or
- (2) employed as a fish and wildlife law enforcement officer by the United States Department of the Interior or the United States Department of Agriculture.

Sec. 08.54.650. TRANSPORTER LICENSE. (a) A person is entitled to a transporter license if the person

- (1) applies for a transporter license on a form provided by the department; and
- (2) pays the license application fee and the license fee.
- (b) A transporter may provide transportation services and accommodations to big game hunters in the field at a permanent lodge, house, or cabin owned by the transporter or on a boat with permanent living quarters located on salt water. A transporter may not provide big game hunting services without holding the appropriate license.
- (c) A transporter shall provide an annual activity report on a form provided by the department. An activity report must contain all information required by the board by regulation.

Sec. 08.54.660. RENEWAL OF GUIDE AND TRANSPORTER LICENSES. (a) An applicant for renewal of a registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, assistant guide, or transporter license shall submit

- (1) a request for renewal of the license on a form provided by the department; and
- (2) the appropriate license fee for the next licensing period.
- (b) The department may not renew a registered guide-outfitter license under this section unless all fees have been paid in full and the registered guide-outfitter has signed an affidavit that all hunt records due during the term of the current license have been filed with the department.
- (c) The department may not renew a transporter license unless all fees have been paid in full and the transporter has signed an affidavit that all activity reports due during the term of the current license have been filed with the department.

Sec. 08.54.670. FAILURE TO RENEW. The department may not issue a license to a person who held a registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide license and who has failed to renew the license under this chapter for four consecutive years unless the person again meets the qualifications for initial issuance of the license.

Sec. 08.54.680. FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS FOR GUIDES AND TRANSPORTERS. (a) The department may require a registered guide, who contracts to guide or outfit a big game hunt, or a transporter to provide proof of financial responsibility up to the amount of \$100,000. A registered guide or transporter may demonstrate financial responsibility by assets, insurance, or a bond in the requisite amount.

- (b) If a registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide personally pilots an aircraft to transport clients during the provision of big game hunting services, the registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide shall have a commercial pilot's rating or a minimum of 500 hours of flying time in the state.
- (c) On or after January 1, 2006, a registered guide-outfitter may not provide big game hunting services and a transporter may not provide transportation services unless the registered guide-outfitter or transporter has entered into a written contract with the client for the provision of those services. A contract to provide big game hunting services must include at least the following information: the name and guide license number of the registered guide-outfitter, the name of the client, a listing of the big game to be hunted, the approximate time and dates that the client will be in the field, a statement as to what transportation is provided by the registered guide-outfitter, and a statement of the amount to be paid for the big game hunting services provided. A contract to provide transportation services must include at least the following information: the name and transporter license number of the transporter, the name of the client, a listing of the big game to be hunted, the approximate time and dates that the client will be in the field, and a statement of the amount to be paid for the transportation services provided. A registered guide-outfitter or transporter shall provide a copy of contracts to provide big game hunting services or transportation service, as appropriate, to the department upon the request of the department. Except as necessary for disciplinary proceedings conducted by the board and as necessary for law enforcement purposes by the Department of Public Safety and the

Department of Law, a copy of a contract provided to the department is confidential. The department may provide a copy of contracts in the possession of the department to the Department of Fish and Game or the Department of Natural Resources upon the request of that department if the department receiving the copy agrees to maintain the confidentiality of the contracts.

Sec. 08.54.710. DISCIPLINE OF GUIDES AND TRANSPORTERS. (a) The board may impose a disciplinary sanction in a timely manner under (c) of this section if the board finds that a licensee

- (1) is convicted of a violation of any state or federal statute or regulation relating to hunting or to provision of big game hunting services or transportation services;
 - (2) has failed to file records or reports required under this chapter;
- (3) has negligently misrepresented or omitted a material fact on an application for any class of guide license or a transporter license; or
 - (4) has breached a contract to provide big game hunting services or transportation services to a client.
 - (b) [Repealed, Sec. 4 ch 49 SLA 2008.]
 - (c) The board may impose the following disciplinary sanctions, singly or in combination:
 - (1) permanently revoke a license;
 - (2) suspend a license for a specified period;
 - (3) censure or reprimand a licensee;
 - (4) impose limitations or conditions on the professional practice of a licensee;
- (5) impose requirements for remedial professional education to correct deficiencies in the education, training, and skill of the licensee;
- (6) impose probation requiring a licensee to report regularly to the board on matters related to the grounds for probation;
 - (7) impose a civil fine not to exceed \$5,000.
- (d) The board shall permanently revoke a transporter license or any class of guide license if the board finds after a hearing that the license was obtained through fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation.
- (e) The board shall suspend or permanently revoke a transporter license or any class of guide license without a hearing if the court orders the board to suspend or permanently revoke the license as a penalty for conviction of an unlawful act. If the board suspends or permanently revokes a license under this subsection, the board may not also impose an administrative disciplinary sanction of suspension or permanent revocation of the same license for the same offense for which the court ordered the suspension or permanent revocation under AS 08.54.720.
- (f) A certified copy of a judgment of conviction of a licensee for an offense is conclusive evidence of the commission of that offense in a disciplinary proceeding instituted against the licensee under this section based on that conviction, regardless of whether the conviction resulted from a plea of nolo contendere or the conviction is under appeal, unless the conviction is overturned on appeal.
- (g) A person whose license is suspended or revoked under this section may not engage in the provision of big game hunting services or transportation services during the period of license suspension or revocation.
- (h) If the board revokes a license under this section, the person whose license has been revoked shall immediately surrender the license to the department.

- (j) The board may suspend or permanently revoke a transporter license or any class of guide license if the board finds after a hearing that the licensee engaged in conduct involving unprofessionalism, moral turpitude, or gross immorality.

- (1) whose right to obtain or exercise the privileges granted by a hunting, guiding, outfitting, or transportation services license is suspended or revoked in another state or in Canada; or
- (2) who is convicted of a violation of any state or federal law or regulation related to hunting or the provision of big game hunting or transportation services for which
 - (A) the person is imprisoned for more than one day; or

- (B) an unsuspended fine of more than \$1,500 is imposed.
- (1) The board may issue a registered guide-outfitter license to a person whose master guide-outfitter license is revoked under (k) of this section.

Sec. 08.54.720. UNLAWFUL ACTS. (a) It is unlawful for a

- (1) person who is licensed under this chapter to knowingly fail to promptly report, unless a reasonable means of communication is not reasonably available, to the Department of Public Safety, and in no event later than 20 days, a violation of a state or federal wildlife or game, guiding, or transportation services statute or regulation that the person reasonably believes was committed by a client or an employee of the person;
- (2) person who is licensed under this chapter to intentionally obstruct or hinder or attempt to obstruct or hinder lawful hunting engaged in by a person who is not a client of the person;
- (3) class-A assistant guide or an assistant guide to knowingly guide a big game hunt except while employed and supervised by a registered guide-outfitter;
- (4) person who holds any class of guide license or transporter license to knowingly enter or remain on private, state, or federal land without prior authorization during the course of providing big game hunting services or transportation services;
 - (5) registered guide-outfitter to knowingly engage in providing big game hunting services outside of
 - (A) a game management unit for which the registered guide-outfitter is certified; or
- (B) a use area for which the registered guide-outfitter is registered under AS 08.54.750 unless the registration requirement for the area has been suspended by the Department of Fish and Game;
- (6) person to knowingly guide without having a current registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide license and a valid Alaska hunting license in actual possession;
 - (7) registered guide-outfitter to knowingly fail to comply with AS 08.54.610(e);
 - (8) person who is licensed under this chapter to knowingly
- (A) commit or aid in the commission of a violation of this chapter, a regulation adopted under this chapter, or a state or federal wildlife or game statute or regulation; or
- (B) permit the commission of a violation of this chapter, a regulation adopted under this chapter, or a state or federal wildlife or game statute or regulation that the person knows or reasonably believes is being or will be committed without
 - (i) attempting to prevent it, short of using force; and
 - (ii) reporting the violation;
- (9) person without a current registered guide-outfitter license to knowingly guide, advertise as a registered guide-outfitter, or represent to be a registered guide-outfitter, except as provided by AS 08.54.635;
- (10) person without a current master guide-outfitter license to knowingly advertise as, or represent to be, a master guide-outfitter;
- (11) person without a current registered guide-outfitter license to knowingly outfit a big game hunt, provide outfitting services, advertise as an outfitter of big game hunts, or represent to be an outfitter of big game hunts;
- (12) person to knowingly provide transportation services to big game hunters without holding a current registered guide-outfitter license or transporter license;
 - (13) person without a current transporter license to knowingly advertise as, or represent to be, a transporter;
 - (14) class-A assistant guide or an assistant guide to knowingly contract to guide or outfit a hunt;
- (15) person licensed under this chapter to knowingly violate a state statute or regulation prohibiting waste of a wild food animal or hunting on the same day airborne;
- (16) person to knowingly provide big game hunting services or transportation services during the period for which the person's license to provide that service is suspended or revoked;
 - (17) registered guide-outfitter, except in the defense of life or property, to knowingly personally take
 - (A) big game while accompanying a client in the field; or
- (B) a species of big game if the registered guide-outfitter is under contract with a client to provide a guided hunt for that species of big game and the client is in the field;
- (18) person who is licensed as a registered guide-outfitter, a class-A assistant guide, or an assistant guide, except in the defense of life or property, to knowingly personally take big game while a client of the registered guide-outfitter by whom the person is employed is in the field unless the person is not participating in, supporting, or otherwise assisting in providing big game hunting services to a client of the registered guide-outfitter by whom the person is employed; or
- (19) person who is licensed as a transporter, or who provides transportation services under a transporter license, to knowingly accompany or remain in the field with a big game hunter who is a client of the person except as necessary to perform the specific duties of embarking or disembarking big game hunters, their equipment, or big game animals harvested by hunters; this paragraph does not apply to a person who holds both a transporter license and a registered guide-outfitter license issued under this chapter when the person has a contract to provide guiding services for the client.
- (b) In addition to a disciplinary sanction imposed under AS 08.54.710, a person who commits an offense set out in (a)(1) (7), (17), (18), or (19) of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine of not more than \$10,000 or by imprisonment up to one year, or both.

- (c) In addition to a disciplinary sanction imposed under AS 08.54.710, a person who commits an offense set out in (a)(8) (14) of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine of not more than \$30,000 or by imprisonment up to one year, or both.
- (d) In addition to a disciplinary sanction imposed under AS 08.54.710, a person who commits an offense set out in (a)(15) of this section is guilty,
- (1) for a first offense, of a misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine of not more than \$30,000 or by imprisonment up to one year, or both;
 - (2) for a second or subsequent offense, of a class C felony.
- (e) In addition to a disciplinary sanction imposed under AS 08.54.710, a person who violates (a)(16) of this section is guilty of a class C felony.

- (4) all guns, fishing tackle, boats, aircraft, automobiles, or other vehicles, camping gear, and other equipment and paraphernalia used in, or in aid of, a violation of (a) of this section may be seized by persons authorized to enforce this chapter and may be forfeited to the state as provided under AS 16.05.195.
- (g) Upon conviction of a person for committing an offense set out in (a) of this section, the execution of sentence may not be suspended and probation may not be granted except on the condition that the minimum term of imprisonment is served. Imposition of sentence may not be suspended.
- Sec. 08.54.730. INJUNCTION AGAINST UNLAWFUL ACTION. When in the judgment of the board, a person has engaged in an act in violation of AS 08.54.620(b), 08.54.630(b), 08.54.650(b), 08.54.710(g), or 08.54.720(a) or the regulations adopted under these statutes, the board may apply to the appropriate court for an order enjoining the action. Upon a showing by the board that the person is engaging in the act, the court shall grant injunctive relief or other appropriate order without bond.
- Sec. 08.54.740. RESPONSIBILITY OF GUIDE OR TRANSPORTER FOR VIOLATIONS. (a) A registered guide-outfitter who contracts to guide or outfit a big game hunt is equally responsible under AS 08.54.710 for a violation of a state or federal wildlife or game or guiding statute or regulation committed by a person while the person provides guide services for the guide-outfitter under AS 08.54.635 or during the course of the person's employment for the registered guide-outfitter.
- (b) A transporter who provides transportation services is equally responsible under AS 08.54.710 for a violation of a state or federal wildlife or game, guiding, or transportation services statute or regulation committed by a person while in the course of the person's employment for the transporter.
- **Sec. 08.54.750. USE AREA REGISTRATION.** (a) At least 30 days before conducting big game hunting services within a guide use area, a registered guide-outfitter shall inform the department, in person or by registered mail on a registration form provided by the department, that the guide-outfitter will be conducting big game hunting services in the use area. A registered guide-outfitter may not withdraw or amend a guide use area registration during the calendar year in which the registration was submitted to the department.
 - (b) A registered guide-outfitter may not register for, or conduct big game hunting services in,
 - (1) more than three guide use areas during a calendar year; or
- (2) a guide use area that is outside of a game management unit for which the registered guide-outfitter is certified under AS 08.54.600.
- (c) Notwithstanding (a) and (b) of this section, a registered guide-outfitter may register to conduct big game hunting services within a guide use area at any time before beginning operations in the guide use area and may conduct big game hunting services in a guide use area, or for a big game species in a guide use area, that is not one of the three guide use areas for which the registered guide-outfitter has registered under (b) of this section if the Department of Fish and Game has determined by regulation that it is in the public interest to suspend the registration requirements for that guide use area or for all guide use areas in a game management unit or game management subunit for a big game species within those guide use areas.
- (d) Notwithstanding (b) of this section, a registered guide-outfitter who is registered in three guide use areas may also register for and conduct big game hunting services in a portion of one additional guide use area on federal land adjacent to a guide use area in which the registered guide-outfitter is already registered if the board finds that the portion of the adjacent guide use area for which the registered guide-outfitter is seeking to be registered would

otherwise remain unused by a registered guide-outfitter because the boundaries of guide use areas do not coincide with boundaries of federal big game guide concession or permit areas.

- (e) Notwithstanding (b) of this section, a registered guide-outfitter who is registered in three guide use areas may also register for and conduct big game hunting services for wolf, black bear, brown bear, or grizzly bear in guide use areas within a game management unit or portion of a game management unit where the Board of Game has identified predation by wolf, black bear, brown bear, or grizzly bear as a cause of the depletion of a big game prey population or a reduction of the productivity of a big game prey population that is the basis for the establishment of an intensive management program in the game management unit or portion of the game management unit or for the declaration of the biological emergency in the game management unit or portion of the game management unit. A registered guide-outfitter may only conduct hunts in a guide use area under this subsection for the big game species identified by the Board of Game as the cause of the depletion or reduction of productivity of a big game prey population.
- (f) At least 60 days before providing transportation services to, from, or in an area as may be determined by the board, a transporter shall inform the department, in person or by registered mail on a registration form provided by the department, that the transporter will be providing transportation services to, from, or in the use area. The board may establish transporter use areas and adopt regulations to implement this subsection as the board considers necessary.
- (g) In this section, "guide use area" means a geographic area of the state identified as a guide-outfitter use area by the former Big Game Commercial Services Board established under former AS 08.54.300 and described on a set of maps titled Guide-Outfitter Use Area Maps, dated June 22, 1994, as amended by the board as the board considers necessary.

Sec. 08.54.760. HUNT RECORDS; CONFIDENTIALITY OF HUNT RECORDS AND ACTIVITY REPORTS. (a) The department shall collect and maintain hunt records provided by a registered guide-outfitter. A registered guide-outfitter shall submit to the department a hunt record for each contracted hunt within 60 days after the completion of the hunt. A hunt record must include a list of all big game hunters who used the guiding or outfitting services of the registered guide-outfitter, the number of each big game species taken, and other information required by the board. The department shall provide forms for reporting hunt records.

- (b) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, hunt records received under this section and activity reports received under AS 08.54.650 are confidential and not subject to inspection or copying under AS 40.25.110 40.25.125. Aggregated data compiled from hunt records and activity reports may be included in reports by the department. The department shall make hunt records and activity reports available
 - (1) if requested, to state agencies, federal law enforcement agencies, and other law enforcement agencies; and
 - (2) to a municipality that levies a tax on those activities, if the
- (A) information concerns hunts or activities occurring within the four calendar years preceding the date of the request; and
 - (B) municipality
 - (i) requests the records for the purpose of verifying taxes payable; and
 - (ii) agrees to maintain the confidentiality of the records.
 - (c) Forms, records, and reports required under this chapter may be distributed, received, and stored electronically.
- (d) The department may charge a municipality a fee, set by the department under AS 37.10.050, to provide a record under (b)(2) of this section.

Sec. 08.54.770. LICENSE AND EXAMINATION FEES. (a) The department shall set fees under AS 08.01.065 for each of the following:

Sec. 08.54.785. CHAPTER NOT APPLICABLE. The provisions of this chapter do not apply to a person providing, for compensation or with the intent to receive compensation, only accommodations to a big game hunter in the field at

- (1) a permanent lodge, house, or cabin on private land owned by the person; or
- (2) a state or federal cabin on state or federal land.

Sec. 08.54.790. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter,

- (1) "any class of guide license" does not include a retired status license issued under AS 08.54.608;
- (2) "big game" means brown bear, grizzly bear, caribou, moose, black bear, bison, Sitka blacktail deer, elk, mountain goat, musk ox, and mountain or Dall sheep; "big game" includes wolf and wolverine when taken under hunting regulations;
- (3) "big game hunting service" means a service for which the provider of the service must obtain a registered guide-outfitter, class-A assistant guide, or assistant guide license; "big game hunting service" includes guiding services and outfitting services;
 - (4) "board" means the Big Game Commercial Services Board;
- (5) "compensation" means payment for services including wages or other remuneration but not including reimbursement for actual expenses incurred;
 - (6) "department" means the Department of Commerce, Community, and Economic Development;
- (7) "field" means an area outside of established year-round dwellings, businesses, or other developments associated with a city, town, or village; "field" does not include permanent hotels or roadhouses on the state road system or state or federally maintained airports;
- (8) "game management unit" means one of the 26 geographic areas defined by the Board of Game for game management purposes;
- (9) "guide" means to provide, for compensation or with the intent or with an agreement to receive compensation, services, equipment, or facilities to a big game hunter in the field by a person who accompanies or is present with the big game hunter in the field either personally or through an assistant; in this paragraph, "services" includes
 - (A) contracting to guide or outfit big game hunts;
 - (B) stalking, pursuing, tracking, killing, or attempting to kill big game;
- (C) packing, preparing, salvaging, or caring for meat, except that which is required to properly and safely load the meat on the mode of transportation being used by a transporter;
 - (D) field preparation of trophies, including skinning and caping;
 - (E) selling, leasing, or renting goods when the transaction occurs in the field;
- (F) using guiding or outfitting equipment, including spotting scopes and firearms, for the benefit of a hunter; and
 - (G) providing camping or hunting equipment or supplies that are already located in the field;
- (10) "licensee" means a person to whom a license, other than a retired status license, has been issued under this chapter;
- (11) "outfit" means to provide, for compensation or with the intent to receive compensation, services, supplies, or facilities, excluding the provision of accommodations by a person described in AS 08.54.785, to a big game hunter in the field, by a person who neither accompanies nor is present with the big game hunter in the field either personally or by an assistant;
- (12) "transportation services" means the carriage for compensation of big game hunters, their equipment, or big game animals harvested by hunters to, from, or in the field; "transportation services" does not include the carriage by aircraft of big game hunters, their equipment, or big game animals harvested by hunters
- (A) on nonstop flights between airports listed in the Alaska supplement to the Airmen's Guide published by the Federal Aviation Administration; or
- (B) by an air taxi operator or air carrier for which the carriage of big game hunters, their equipment, or big game animals harvested by hunters is only an incidental portion of its business; in this subparagraph, "incidental" means transportation provided to a big game hunter by an air taxi operator or air carrier who does not
 - (i) charge more than the usual tariff or charter rate for the carriage of big game hunters, their equipment, or big game animals harvested by hunters; or
 - (ii) advertise transportation services or big game hunting services to the public; in this subsubparagraph, "advertise" means soliciting big game hunters to be customers of an air taxi operator or air carrier for the purpose of providing air transportation to, from, or in the field through the use of print or electronic media, including advertising at trade shows, or the use of hunt broker services or other promotional services.

- 12 AAC 75.100. APPLICATION FOR REGISTERED GUIDE-OUTFITTER EXAMINATION. (a) An applicant for a registered guide-outfitter license who is applying under AS 08.54.610(a)(3)(A) must submit,
 - (1) at least 120 days before the date of the next scheduled registered guide-outfitter examination,
 - (A) the applicable fees required in 12 AAC 02.230;
- (B) a completed application on a form provided by the department; the applicant must indicate if the applicant will be contracting to provide big game commercial services during the licensing period for which the applicant is applying;
- (C) a list of hunters for whom the applicant has provided big game hunting services in compliance with AS 08.54.610(a)(8);
 - (D) a written certification by the applicant on a form provided by the department certifying the applicant's

- (5) a sworn statement by the applicant attesting to the ability to provide services on at least 5,000 contiguous acres of uplands in the guide use area requested:
 - (6) whether registration is for a single calendar year or multiple calendar years.
- (b) Unless it is issued for multiple calendar years, a guide use area registration issued under AS 08.54.750 and this section expires on December 31 of each year. A registration for multiple calendar years expires on December 31 of the last year for which it is issued. To re-register, the registered guide-outfitter must again submit a complete application under (a) of this section.
- (c) A registered guide-outfitter may register for a maximum of five calendar years ending on December 31, including the calendar year in which the registration becomes effective. A registration for multiple calendar years may be withdrawn or changed annually, with the withdrawal or change to take effect on or after January 1 of the next calendar year.
- (d) In accordance with AS 08.54.750, a registration will be considered effective 30 days after the date the registration is submitted to the department, or 30 days after the date the application is considered complete, whichever is later.
- (e) A registered guide-outfitter who is registered in three guide use areas may register for and conduct big game hunting services in a portion of one additional guide use area on federal land adjacent to a guide use area for which the registered guide-outfitter is already registered if the registered guide-outfitter meets the requirements of (a)(1) (5) and (f) of this section, and submits
- (1) the guide use area map that identifies the portion of the additional guide use area that is located on federal land and is adjacent to a guide use area for which the registered guide-outfitter is currently registered; and
- (2) a letter from the federal landholder that states that the area would otherwise remain unused by a registered guide-outfitter because the boundaries do not coincide with boundaries of a federal big game guide concession or permit area.
- (f) A registered guide-outfitter may not register for, or provide services within, a guide use area unless the applicant has written authorization by the landowner or appropriate representative in the form of a permit, registration or letter to provide big game hunting services on at least 5,000 contiguous acres of uplands in the guide use area.
- (g) A registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter who was unable to hunt a brown bear in game management unit 9 in the spring 2020 season may register for the 2021 spring brown bear season in game management unit 9, if
 - (1) the registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter registers on a form provided by the department;
 - (2) the registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter provides either
- (A) a current registration, valid as of April 10, 2020, for the same guide use area for which the registration is submitted; or
- (B) copies of completed, signed, and dated hunt contracts for the 2020 spring bear season in game management unit 9 indicating that the registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter had booked clients who were later unable to complete the contracted hunt and an attestation that the registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter would have registered before the April 10, 2020 deadline; and
- (3) the clients for whom the registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter will provide services have not hunted brown bear in a guide use area within game management unit 9 since May 10, 2020.
- (h) A registered guide-outfitter or master guide-outfitter must register for a minimum of three years in a guide use area at the time of registration.

The contracting registered guide-outfitter shall write to the client within 60 days after the conclusion of the hunt.
- (e) A registered guide-outfitter shall document on the hunt record the date the registered guide-outfitter complied with the verbal, or if applicable the written, client communication requirements in (c) and (d) of this section.

 - (c) A registered guide-outfitter shall retain a copy of the contract for at least four years.

- (B) sufficient supplies are present to provide for emergencies, including food, clothing, and a source of heat; and
 - (C) food and shelter are present that are normally considered satisfactory under field conditions;
 - (2) avoid intentionally, recklessly, or carelessly exposing an employee or client to undue hazards;
- (3) advise clients and employees involved in a hunt of the applicable state and federal statutes and regulations relating to hunting, land use, wildlife, big game hunting services, and conservation;
- (4) ensure that the proper hunting licenses, hunt record, game tags, and harvest reports for the big game species being hunted are in the client's possession before the hunt begins;
- (5) ensure that the appropriate tags are attached to any game taken by a client and all game is sealed or marked as required by 5 AAC 92;

(6) advise a client before a hunt of the game population in the hunting area; and

(7) provide remuneration in a complete and timely manner of debts or refunds owed to clients or contracting guides, or wages owed to an employee.

(d) Field craft standards. All classes of guides shall

- (1) conduct themselves in a professional sportsman like manner, and treat wildlife, wild lands, and all users with courtesy and respect;
- (2) use every lawful means at the licensee's disposal to bag a wounded animal while it is in danger of escaping, or, in a serious emergency, while human life or well-being is endangered;
- (3) barring unforeseen conditions, properly prepare according to generally accepted procedures, all antlers, horns, hides, and capes to be delivered to the taxidermist or to the client at the conclusion of a hunt in a satisfactory and unspoiled condition, unless the guide is providing only outfitting and transportation services for the client;
- (4) endeavor to salvage all meat of animals taken by clients, in accordance with state statutes and regulations;
- (5) except for brown bear, grizzly bear, wolves, and wolverine, transport the meat of a big game animal taken by the client in accordance with 5 AAC 92;
 - (6) respect gear, equipment, food, shelter, and camps established by other users;
 - (7) avoid staging unused or unattended camps and gear to discourage other users from utilizing a location;
- (8) allow appropriate buffer areas between hunters and camps in order to avoid disrupting hunts and hunting experiences;
- (9) refrain from using any mechanical powered equipment to knowingly herd, drive, chase, or harass big game animals;
- (10) to avoid altering the hunting experience of other hunters, refrain from making multiple, consecutive approaches in any mechanical powered equipment, near any big game animal or group of big game animals during any open hunting season for that species, unless
- (A) hunting brown, grizzly, or black bears from January 1 through June 30 in an area with an allowable harvest under 5 AAC 85 and 5 AAC 92, of one or more brown or grizzly bears per regulatory year; in this subparagraph, "regulatory year" has the meaning given in 5 AAC 92.990; or
 - (B) specifically authorized under another statute or regulation;
- (11) avoid utilizing global positioning system (GPS) or other electronic devices to locate and stalk a big game animal for the purpose of harvest; and
- (12) respond personally or through an assistant to requests for assistance communicated during the hunt; a contracting or employing guide must respond within a reasonable time based on the urgency of the request, weather conditions, and other safety factors.

 - (b) Compliance with law. A transporter or registered guide-outfitter providing transportation services shall
 - (1) comply with applicable state and federal statutes and regulations; and
- (2) obtain prior authorization as appropriate before entering or remaining on private, state, or federal lands during the course of providing transportation services.
- (c) Client care and transportation standards. A transporter or registered guide-outfitter providing transportation services shall

- (1) take every reasonable measure to ensure the safety and comfort of the client, including ensuring that while the licensee is providing transportation services
- (A) adequate supplies are present to provide first aid for injuries that are reasonably expected while providing transportation services; and
- (B) sufficient supplies are present to provide for emergencies, including food, clothing, and a source of heat;
- (2) before leaving a client in the field, advise the client of the date, time, and location at which the transporter or registered guide-outfitter will pick up the client and the course of action the client should follow if the transporter or registered guide-outfitter is unable to pick up the client as planned;
- (3) transport the client into and out of the filed at the planned date, time, and location, unless prevented by weather, mechanical problems, or other safety concerns;
 - (4) check on or communicate with a client in the field as agreed to before transporting that client;
- (5) clearly define rates and services to prospective clients before booking and acceptance of deposits, and shall avoid misleading prospective clients through false or fictitious advertising;
- (6) be willing and capable of making financial restitution to a client for any breach of contract owing to no fault of the client;
 - (7) avoid staging unused or unattended camps and gear to discourage other users from utilizing a location;
- (8) endeavor to transport all meat of animals taken by clients, in accordance with state statutes and regulations;
 - (9) avoid using an aircraft in any manner to spot big game for the purpose of taking a specific animal;
- (10) avoid utilizing, in any manner, global positioning system (GPS) or other electronic devices to assist in the taking of a big game animal;
 - (11) avoid herding, driving, or chasing animals with the use of mechanically powered equipment;
- (12) avoid overbooking clients such that the transporter or registered guide-outfitter is unable to take otherwise reasonable measures to ensure the safety and comfort of clients already in the field;
- (13) allow appropriate buffer areas between hunters and camps transported by the same service to avoid disrupting hunts and hunt experiences; and
 - (14) avoid making guarantees as to the success of a hunt or the number of animals to be taken on a hunt.
- (d) Standards for cooperation with law enforcement officers and for conservation awareness. A transporter or registered guide-outfitter providing transportation services shall
 - (1) cooperate with state or federal law enforcement officers;
 - (2) provide any information to assist law enforcement or state and federal wildlife officials; and
- (3) practice sound wildlife conservation and create an awareness of conservation needs and practices when dealing with the public.

- (10) identify the methods of communication with the transporter during the time clients are in the field, such as use of a satellite phone, VHF radio, overflight, or signal device;
 - (11) state who is responsible for the cost of extra trips to transport meat if necessary;
- (12) include the following statement: "A licensed transporter may provide transportation services with accommodations only at a permanent lodge, house, or cabin owned by the transporter or on a boat with permanent living quarters located on salt water. A licensed transporter may not accompany or remain in the field with a big game hunter who is a client of the transporter except as necessary to perform transportation services"; and

- (13) include the following statement: "A licensed transporter may not provide vehicles, fuel, camping, hunting equipment, or any hunting services such as skinning, caping, or cleaning of game, glassing, and packing in the field, including from a permanent structure or on a boat on salt water."
 - (c) A transporter shall retain a copy of the contract for at least four years.
- (d) During portions of a hunt, a transporter is exempt from transporter contracting requirements of this section when providing transportation services for a client to, from, or in between specific locations operated by another transporter or registered guide-outfitter who has contracted this same hunt with the same client.

Accomplishments

- The board was reauthorized by the legislature for eight years.
 - The board passed the sunset audit with flying colors, largely due to former Chairman Jason Bunch, with just a few small suggestions to the Board and division from the Auditors. The only suggestion to the Board was to find a private landholder to fill the vacant seat. This has not happened, although we have reached out to numerous individuals.
- A Bill was introduced during the Legislative Session to create an Executive Administrator position dedicated to the BGCSB. This bill ran out of time but was widely supported. In the interim, the Department has placed Tom Bay in this position so we are no longer sharing him with the Board of Marine Pilots.
- The board has nearly completed the regulatory process to change several Guide Use Area boundries to better suit a viable business in these areas. This project should be complete and in regulation before the 2025 fall hunting season.
- Continue to build and strengthen partnerships between the various agencies involved in the guide profession including ADF&G, Alaska Wildlife Troopers and the various land managers.
- A Guide Concession Program (GCP) bill was successfully passed through the Legislature in 2024 with the help of various agencies. The program will be hosted by DNR. The bill did not have a fiscal not attached so funding is in question.
- Work with the department to finish an automated hunt record filing system.
 - This project has been in the works for several years. Hunt records and transporter activity reports take up to 50% of staff time to manually enter the data. It seems the IT department is now working to make it a reality. The Director has committed to it being finished by our March meeting.
- Continue to monitor trends in violations and make adjustments as required.
 - The board continually monitors trends in violations and makes adjustments as needed. Violations have continued to be stable and mostly minor. The few major Violations are frustratingly slow to make it to the Board. The worst violators continue operating for years while their criminal violations work through the system. We are working with OSP and our investigative staff to try to expidite these cases.
- Add sublegal animal violations to the board's disciplinary matrix.
 - This needs to be officially added to the matrix but it has been used in several cases. Our goal is competence and compliance in licensees. In the case of a sublegal animal take, the reviewing board members have been suggesting a certain number of hunts for that species where the licensee must act as a packer before they are allowed to guide a hunter on their own. This is usually 1-3 hunts, depending on severity of the violation or if it is a first offense or more.
- Promptly adjudicate consent agreements for minor violations.
 - This has become a priority for the board. Minor violtions usually happen unintentionally and are very stressful for licensees. Individual board members and the board's investigator have done a great job getting these issues cleared up promptly.
- The board has been updating GUA exams. Many of these have been updated but more discussion is needed as to the efficacy of these exams and the practicality of updating them every few years.
- The board is constantly updating RGO testing and the Department is constantly updating study material. This is an ongoing task.
- The board establishes subcommittees/workgroups as needed. Curently there is a Transporter workgroup and a Legislative subcommittee. We anticipate a subcommittee/workgroup to deal with the GCP.
- Continue to strengthen public trust and participation through communication, education and efficiency. Public comment is provided at most meetings and everybody's voice that wants to be heard is.

Accomplishments

Activities

- The board will continue to work on regulation projects and make efforts to streamline processes where possible. Current regulation projects include amendments to the following regulations:
 - 12 AAC 75.200, REGISTERED GUIDE-OUTFITTER PROVIDING SERVICES
 - 12 AAC 75.230, GUIDE USE AREA REGISTRATION
 - 12 AAC 75.240, SUPERVISION
 - 12 AAC 75.250, PARTICIPATION IN A HUNT
 - 12 AAC 75.400, TRANSPORTER ACTIVITY REPORT
 - 12 AC 75.440, PROFESSIONAL ETHICS STANDARS FOR PROVIDERS OF TRANSPORTATION SERVICES.

Other current regulation projects include creating new regulations for the defining of boat-based transporters with living accommodations on saltwater, marking of aircraft and boats used by guides and transporters, and helicopter use.

- The board is behind on getting regulation projects out for public comment. This is primarily due to the complication of the regulations process at the department over the last five or more years, and the overburden of tasks to staff being shared between multiple Boards. The board has also experienced some turnover in members and the chairman.
- In addition to current regulatory projects, the board will continue work on the following: Complete the process to help DNR implement the Guide Concession Program as authorized by statute. Construct a workgroup for transporter concessions.
- Start a new regulations project to simply repeal unneeded regulations.
 - There are regulations that are duplicates, outdated and simply uneeded. A repeal project should be simple with no delays for in-house legal review because the board has sole authority to repeal regulations.
- Seek Legislative support to
 - -Provide for emergency situations by relaxing some regulations for a contracting guide-outfitter in some situations.
 - -Add survivorship for emergency transfers.
 - -Remove some former regulations from statute so the board may make changes.
 - -Allow for hunt planner and booking agent licenses.
 - -Add (two?) guide seats to the board to ease the workload of board members.
 - -Provide Commissioner emergency authority to deal with unforeseen situations (covid, licensee illness, deaths, etc.)
 - -Authorize the Board to implement continuing education for licensees.
 - -Streamline the regulations process for all boards in the licensing division, similar to the ADF&G board's process.
 - -Authorize all DCCED boards to prioritize spending of license funds as trustees of these funds.
- Continue to strengthen the ethics standards. We continue to incorporate ethical violations into sanction actions. Moving forward, ethics violations may need to be incorporated into the disciplinary guidelines and precedence matrix. These violations are very difficult to maneuver and often times are without enough proof to justify board action. The board recognizes these barriers and plans to move forward with procedures to aid in the decision process of ethics violations once current projects are complete.

Needs

- \$2000 for member travel to represent the BGCSB at Board of Game meetings.
- Funding to have staff proctor practical exams. (4 days per year)
- Discussion about meetings

Do we continue in person meetings, with very little attendance, that are not able to be held where the industry hot topic issues?

Should we hold more, shorter meetings, more frequent, via zoom?

- Discussion about license fees

Do we need to lower fees to claw back the surpluss that we are not allowed to spend to help our licensees? Are investigations hearings going to be paid by the General Fund?
