She presented both the Fiscal Year 2024 fourth-quarter financial report and the Fiscal Year 2025 first-quarter report. Starting with the fourth quarter report, which ended on June 30, 2024, you'll see financial information above the blue line, representing the program's total revenue. To clarify, this report includes cumulative data for both foreign pleasure craft and marine pilot revenues and expenditures. For Fiscal Year 2024, the total revenue from licensing fees was \$53,590, with an additional \$742 from the general fund. In terms of expenditures, we differentiate between direct and indirect costs. The direct costs, which include personal services, totaled \$41,348. Non-investigative travel expenses, primarily for board member meetings, amounted to \$14,012. Legal services cost \$10,107, and interagency mediation added another \$2,429, bringing total non-investigative expenditures to \$76,096. For investigative costs, we spent \$8,954 on personal services related to investigations, with total investigative costs reaching \$9,295. Overall, the total expenditures amount to \$85,391. Due to delays and billing for legal costs and RSA services, we face some challenges with the first-quarter report. While I've included a placeholder to show the current situation, more detailed information will be available in the next reports. For total revenue, we have three closed bienniums, and we're now working on the new biennium for 2024 and 2025. Investigator III Patrick Kase provided the investigative report to the board. Currently, there is one open case regarding a contested license denial that has been ongoing for some time, categorized as litigation initiated. As for closed cases, there have been four. Two were self-reported marine pilot incidents that closed with no action, as they were properly disclosed. Another was a license application review related to a previously reported vessel collision, which was also closed. The last case involved unlicensed practice, resolved with a non-disciplinary letter of advisement.

Question from the board: Is there any indication of a timeline for the resolution of the case in litigation? A current status by the next meeting would be appreciated. Investigator Kase will reach out to the Dept. of Law to see if he can have an update before the next board meeting.

NOAA – Office of Coast Survey (S-100 charts, new navigation tool)

Caroline Wilkinson with NOAA's Office of Coast Survey provided an overview of the new navigational tool, the S-100 charts to the board and association representatives. . She discussed the new S-102 products, which are rolling out in Southeast Alaska and will eventually expand to all of Alaska. As the Alaska Navigation Manager, she oversees ocean floor mapping priorities. Vessels are currently using the S-57 standard for nautical charting, set by the International Maritime Organization (IMO), but will soon transition to the S-100 standard. This change will alter how charts are displayed and how data layers are organized. ECDIS machines will start rolling out with S-100 compatibility this year, though it's unlikely you'll encounter one on a ship until after 2029, when all new systems must accept S-100 charts.

The discussion focused on S-102, the bathymetry layer that can be toggled on and off within charts. Other interactive layers will include water levels and surface currents, with additional layers sourced from various federal and state agencies in the future. Our immediate focus is on basic electronic nautical charts, while advanced ice and weather layers are expected around 2027 or 2028.

This initiative is part of precision navigation, which allows vessels to navigate safely and efficiently by accessing integrated data layers. The goal is to combine various navigational information—tides, charts, and weather—into a single interface, allowing you to easily toggle between layers.

Accomplishments

Over the course of the year, the board continued its work to establish, audit and enforce the standard as set in Alaska Statute 08.62 to:

- Ensure that persons entering the practice meet rigorous standards of competency, and maintain such standards during their practice;
- Assist the public in the knowledge of who is licensed
- (https://www.commerce.alaska.gov/web/cbpl/ProfessionalLicensing/BoardofMarinePilots.aspx);
- Approve the standards by which pilot organizations are operated and trainees are selected;
- Approve or disapprove rates for pilotage services;
- Ensure that drug and alcohol testing is compliant;
- Ensure that sufficient pilots are available to provide service;
- Vessels subject to pilotage have a licensed pilot while transiting compulsory waters; and
- Educate the public about the statutes and regulations governing marine pilotage in Alaska.

The board reviewed, updated, and published the foreign pleasure craft packet for 2024. The board also maintained its review of applications for pleasure craft of foreign registry seeking exemption from pilotage for vessels between 65 feet and 175 feet. The board approves pilotage exemptions if the requesting vessel meets the exemption requirements in 12 AAC 56.115. For FY 2024, the board approved 13 applications for exemption from pilotage requirements for foreign pleasure crafts. Foreign pleasure craft exemptions generated \$40,700 in FY 2024.

The board approved licenses for nine Deputy Marine Pilots and seven Marine Pilots. Core and Local Knowledge exams were administered to 14 total candidates.

The board updated the Core and Local Knowledge Exams while transitioning to a new testing software system.

Lucas Hasenbank and Richard Harris completed their terms on the board. Both seats have been filled and the board is currently fully staffed.

Investigations – In FY 2024 four new investigations were opened, and four investigations were closed. Two cases remain open.

Activities

The board has a current regulations project in process with a proposal to amend 12 AAC 56.080(e) to change the amount of piloting experience required of a Deputy Marine Pilot during the preceding licensing period for renewal, to meet the board's original intent when it was created. The same regulation project includes a proposal to amend 12 AAC 56.070(a) to remove an outdated examination reference, and remove the requirement of examinations to be offered at a meeting of the board. Lastly, included in the same regulations project are proposals to amend multiple sections of 12 AAC 56.025 to amend requirements to allow applicants additional time to submit and complete applications and the application requirements. This will allow for faster processing times.

The board has a current regulations project in process with a proposal to to amend 12 AAC 56.028 to allow license candidates the option to finish certain training requirements at a manned model facility.

The board met four times during fiscal year 2024:

- July 12, 2023, via teleconference
- October 11, 2023, in Anchorage
- January 25, 2024, in Anchorage
- April 24, 2024, in Juneau

During these quarterly meetings, the board had participation from NOAA (presentation on charting), CLIA/CLAA (reports on cruise ship season and outlook for next season), and all three of the state pilot associations (association reports from AMP, SEAP, SWAPA).

The board continued to support association bylaw and training program amendments while ensuring changes comport with statute and regulation.

Needs

The board is seeking information about the impact that Alternative Planning Criteria (APC) has in the state and possible conflicts with state pilotage regulations. SWAPA highlighted several issues with vessels being given navigation direction without the input of state licensed pilots, jeopardizing navigation safety. Once fully understood, the board will work to include the pilot associations in the APC.
The board needs the division to remove the Big Game Commercial Services Board from the MPC's job duties and replace it with another board that is not as active.
The board is in a renewal year and is expecting to begin the renewal process in October.

For FY 2025, the board approved applications for exemption from pilotage requirements for foreign pleasure crafts. Foreign pleasure craft exemptions generated \$40,700 in FY 2024.
The board approved licenses for Deputy Marine Pilots and Marine Pilots. Core and Local Knowledge exams were administered to total candidates.
Investigations – for FY 2025, new investigations were opened and investigations were closed Cases remain open.

Activities

The board has a current regulations project in process with a proposal to amend 2 regulations.

- I. Amendment of 12 AAC 56.500(a) amends the language for VLCC endorsement required for dock/undock vessels
- II. Amendment of 12 AAC 56.080(c) amends the regional training requirements for Deputy Marine Pilots in Region 3; Western Alaska

The board met four times during fiscal year 2025:

- •July 23, 2024, via teleconference
- •October 24, 2024, via teleconference
- •January 29, 2025, in Anchorage
- •April 16, 2025, in Ketchikan

During these quarterly meetings, the board had participation from NOAA (presentation on charting), CLIA/CLAA (reports on cruise ship season and outlook for next season), and all three of the state pilot associations (association reports from AMP, SEAP, SWAPA).

The board continued to support association bylaws and training program amendments while ensuring changes comport with statutes and regulations.

Alaska Marine Pilots have proposed a regulations amendment for 12 AAC 56.080

Proposal to amend Regulation change submitted to Marine Pilot Coordinator on March 010, 2025 by Alaska Marine Pilots, Region 3.

Chapter 56. Board of Marine Pilots

(Words in **boldface and underlined** indicate language being added; words [CAPITALIZED AND BRACKETED] indicate language being deleted.)

Proposed changes to **12 AAC 56.028** are as follows:

12 AAC 56.080. Regional Requirements For Deputy Marine Pilots License.

- (c) Western Alaska Region An applicant for a deputy marine pilot license in the Western Alaska Region must possess a valid United States Coast Guard license with an endorsement of first class pilotage without tonnage restrictions for the region as specified in the regional training program approved by the board in 12 AAC 56.035. An applicant shall meet the requirements for supervised movements in the regional training program approved by the board, including
 - (1) completion of 90 supervised movements in active ports throughout the region, including
 - (A) Dutch Harbor/Captains Bay <u>30 dockings and 30 undockings</u> [25 DOCKINGS AND 25 UNDOCKINGS] as follows:
 - (i) 10 of the dockings and 10 of the undockings must be performed within the period beginning October 1 and ending April 1;
 - (ii) 10 of the dockings and 10 of the undockings must be performed at night;
 - (iii) no more than 40 perfect of the dockings and 40 perfect of the undockings may be made under the supervision of the same training pilot;
 - (iv) a minimum of 15 of the dockings and 15 of the undockings [10 DOCKINGS 10 UNDOCKINGS] in Dutch Harbor;
 - (B) in addition to the dockings and undockings required under (A) of this paragraph, <u>5 dockings and 5 undockings</u> [10 DOCKINGS AND 10 UNDOCKINGS] performed at any combination of outports within the region in accordance with the regional training program approved by the board;
