A. <u>Telehealth - Lisa Radley, Physical Therapist</u>

Ms. Radley prepared proposed regulations and FAQs for supervision of assistants via telehealth. For her project she asked, "can a Physical Therapist or Occupational Therapist provide supervision to physical therapy assistants or occupational therapy assistants via telemedicine"? Yes, direct supervision of a physical therapy assistant or an occupational therapy assistant may be provided onsite or via telemedicine when in-person supervision is not possible due to geographic or health and safety constraints; and must be provided at a minimum of once per month. She researched other jurisdictions to assist her with this project.

The Board discussed the benefits of having clarity on how a Physical Therapist or Occupational Therapist could supervise a PTA or OTA via telehealth. In addition to the proposed draft wording recommended by Ms. Radley the Board determined to include "or supervises via telehealth" to 12 AAC 54.510 (g)(3) for physical therapists and 12 AAC 54.810 (b)(3) for occupational therapists. With the current COVID health crisis there are times when patients benefit from telehealth. The Board also recognized that telehealth is only an option to see patients when in-person is compromised. The State Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy Board Principals of Practice clearly state in Principle 1: Patient/Client Safety and Well Being: 2. Act in the best interest of the patient/client. It is the duty of each therapist to determine when telehealth is needed. It is not to replace inperson services and only to allow an option for telehealth when necessary.

The purpose of this project is to clarify in regulation the role of Physical Therapist or Occupational Therapist in supervision of PTA/OTA under telerehabilitation.

PHYSICAL THERAPY PROPOSED REGULATION CHANGES:

The physical therapist shall be available for consultation with the physical therapy assistant that may be provided by telephone, verbally, or in writing.

STANDARDS FOR PRACTICE OF TELEREHABILITATION BY OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST (a) The purpose of this section is to establish standards for the practice of telerehabilitation by means of an interactive telecommunication system by an occupational therapist licensed under AS 08.84 and this chapter in order to provide occupational therapy to patients who are located in the state of Alaska and do not have access to an occupational therapist in person due to geographic or health and safety constraints.

The Board thanked Ms. Radley for the proposed draft wording for her project.

B. TOEFL Scores - Nathan Missler, Occupational Therapist

Mr. Missler provided the proposed verbiage for regulatory change to amend the TOEFL scores to meet scores the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) are enacting in 2022. This topic to match the future scores has been monitored and discussed by this Board over the past few years. FSBPT research determined the new scores better reflect the proficiency to understand and communicate in the English language. With the Board adopting them now, it will not interfere with any current processes for applicants and it will allow future foreign-trained applicants to be able to meet the FSBPT requirements.

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- 199 (B) speaking -26 points;
- 200 (C) reading comprehension 21 points;
 - (D) listening comprehension 18 points.

PROPOSED LANGUAGE for Physical Therapy:

- 12 AAC 54.040 (j)(4) if the applicant has taken the Test of English as a Foreign Language Internet-Based Test (TOEFL iBT), the applicant must obtain at least the following minimum scores:
- (A) writing 22 points;
- (B) speaking <mark>24</mark> points;
- (C) reading comprehension -22 points;
- (D) listening comprehension 21 points.

The Board thanked Mr. Missler for completing this project.

TASK: Staff will ask regulations specialist if there should be a transition date of acceptance for TOEFL exam scores received prior to the date the new scores are enacted.

C. <u>Alternative Approval Pathway (AAP) with Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy</u> (FSBPT) - Jennifer Carlson, Physical Therapist, Chair

Ms. Carlson prepared the proposed regulations. Current regulations require Physical Therapy applicants by exam to be approved by the Board to take or retake the national exam if they fail. This results in additional steps and delays in the licensing process. Current Alaska law recognizes students in the occupational therapy profession are certified by the NBCOT and that they approve OT/OTA students to take the national examination.

The Board has discussed the Alternative Approval Pathway (AAP) contract for several years. The proposed regulations, once enacted, will streamline the process for physical therapy students from educational programs approved by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy (CAPTE) to be approved by the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) to take the national examination, retake the exam if needed and assist with any request for examination accommodations. When the regulations are adopted the Division would qualify to sign the AAP contract. Board members reviewed the contract and noted the four key items in the AAP Contract with FSBPT.

- 1. Be approved by the FSBPT to take the national examination
- 2. Be approved by the FSBPT for testing accommodations (when necessary).
- 3. Clarify in Alaska regulation the Board will only approve applicants by examination up to a lifetime limit of six times (6x) to take the national exam.
- 4. Clarify in Alaska regulation that a student educated as a PT would not qualify to take the PTA exam

Transitional Language may be necessary for anyone applying by credentials and passing the exam prior to the law change. The regulations specialist will draft that language.

For the Record: Currently, AAP only applies for graduates from CAPTE accredited programs. For our non-CAPTE applicants, the board will still need to review the credential evaluation and TOEFL scores to determine if they meet the standards contained in Alaska law. This is another reason to amend 12 AAC 54.030 to just reference submission of passing NPTE scores. Foreign Educated PT applicants will still need to meet that standard.

PHYSICAL THERAPY PROPOSED REGULATION CHANGES:

The passing score will equal a scaled score of 600 based on a scale ranging from 200 to 800.

(d) A lifetime limit for taking the NPTE of less than six (6) and

(e) A prohibition not permitting a Candidate educated as a physical therapist to take the NPTE for physical therapist assistants.

The meeting was running behind and board members, Calhoon and Missler both had patients waiting on them. They agreed with the proposed regulations, but could not stay for the motion or vote. Calhoon and Missler both signed off at 2:03 p.m.

Four board members remained so the meeting could continue. They determined the proposed regulations were ready to be submitted to Regulations Specialist, Jun Maiquis. They will ask for the draft regulation language to be completed and available for review at the February 11-12, 2021 board meeting so they could adopt and public notice for a 30-day written public comment period.
